MUSIC CITY SPRING

JOHNSON MOORE TOPS

Johnson Moore of Nashville won the strong Music City Spring event with $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$. He accomplished this with wins over Master Henry Robinson and 2nd place finisher Dusan Tutush among others. Only in the last round did he agree to a draw to Expert Brian McCarthy thereby clinching the title. This win along with his two wins over Expert Richard Carpenter in the match against Knoxville will surely put him over the 2000 mark.

Second place with 4-1 went to Dusan Tutush from FT. Campbell, KY, the only out-of-stater competing. Brian McCarthy and Tom Farr, both of Hermitage divided the third place prize by scoring $3\frac{1}{2}$ points.

Morris Lewis made his debut as a TD and did a creditable job. Since TCN was late and the event not advertised in CL the attendance was disappointing. But this allowed half of the players to become prize winners.

Cumberland County

Henry Robinson and Richard Carpenter scored the perfect four points to tie for first in the Cumberland County Spring Open. A total of 46 players competed for the prizes (This is the smallest one day open tournament in Crossville for year).

Tieing for second with $3\frac{1}{2}$ were Brian McCarthy, Ron Easter, and Kent McCormack.

CHATTANOOGA

The first tournament in many a moon was held in Chattanooga May 2nd, THE CHATTANOOGA SPRING OPEN. Thirty-two tournament veterans appeared from five states (GA, TN, AL & KY & OH). As expected the top rated swordsman, Richard Carpenter, with blade and dagger in hand bested the field with a perfect 4 wins.

Hendersonville's own sun, Jack ~~Carney~~ capture sole possession of the second place booty at $3\frac{1}{2}$. In the scramble for third there was a six way tie: (at 3 points) Scott Godfrey, John Stremel, Ron Easter, Ed Rudzik, Art Ganey, Jim Watson and Larry Ousley.

The tournament was directed by Harry Sabine.

Nashville Clobbers Knoxville

An eight men team from Nashville played a team from Knoxville a match winning by the lopsided score of 12-4. The match took place on April 26 on the campus of Tennessee Tech. in Cookeville.

Perhaps the margin was not surprising considering the Knoxville team was out-rated on six out of the eight boards. But even on the top two boards were Knoxville had the higher ratings Nashville had a 3-1 advantage. The average rating for the Nashville team was 1800 and for Knoxville 1724.

the RECLUSE

"...shut away from the world; secluded; solitary..." -- This is the definition of recluse as given by Websters New World Dictionary. That definition may refer just as easily to chess pieces as it does to humans. I consider a chess piece to be a recluse if (1) the piece cannot gain the co-operation of his compatriots (e.g. work together to make threats) and (2) the piece cannot, for some reason or another, come into contact with a certain area of the chess board. Unless both of the above requirements are fulfilled, the strategy given in the examples below will be very difficult to carry out safely.

Since we now know that a recluse is cut off from a certain sector of the board, our strategy becomes apparent: Provided one of our own pieces is not a recluse, all we need to do is gang-up in the area that the recluse is cut off from. This will give us one more piece in that area than our opponent, and surely with an extra piece we can win some material. This strategy, by the way, explains why the first requirement given above must be fulfilled. If we are going to move most or even all of our pieces into one area, away from the recluse, then we had better make sure that the recluse cannot join-up with his "companions" and counter-attack. In other words, if a recluse can join in on a counterattack, then we have misjudged the piece and it was never really a recluse, and our own position will be attacked with great energy by the enemy. His attack will be doubly strong due to the fact that our own pieces have vacated the area of the "recluse". So, be sure you are dealing with a true recluse before embarking on the "recluse strategy". Also, again, be sure you too do not have a recluse; since if you do, it will not be able to participate in your invasion and you won't have an extra piece to attack with as mentioned above. Now for some examples:

Knezevic - Karaklajic 1975

1. g3 d5 2. f4 c6 3. Nf3 Bg4 4. Bg2 Nd7
5. O-O e6 6. d3 Ngf6 7. Nbd2 Bc5 8. Kh1
Re3 9. Nb3 Bxcl 10. Qxcl O-O (Here Black should have played 10...Bxf3. The reason will become apparent.) 11. Ng1! (Knezevic shows a deep understanding of the position. It is at this point that he mapped out the

course of the entire game: The Black Bishop will be turned into a recluse, then White will swing his army to the Queen side and win material.) 11. . Bf5 12. Qe1 h5 13. e4 dxe4 14. dxe4 Bh7 15. Rd1 Qe7 16. e5! (At first glance this looked horrible. Now Black's Bishop has all kinds of scope. How can such a piece be called a recluse? Lets look at it objectively: The Black Bishop's scope is increased but it is still cut off from the Queen side and it still has no co-ordination with other Black pieces. Therefore it is still a recluse and Knezevic will continue his "recluse strategy".) 16...Nd5 17. c4 N5b6 18. Na5 Nc5 19. Qh4 Rfe8 20. Ne2 Nd3 (Black can get rid of his recluse with 20...Bd3 and 21...Bxe2, But that would leave his opponent with a very powerful Bishop, so he prefers to keep the recluse a while longer, also tempting is 20...Be4 but then 21. Bxe4 Nxe4 22. Qxe7 Rxe7 23. Rd4 Nc5 24. Rfd1 White gets control of the open file. Black must keep his recluse awhile longer. Meanwhile the rest of White's army heads for the Queen-side.) 21. Qxe7 Rxe7 22. b3 Rd8 23. Nc3 Red7 24. Kgl Nc5 25. Rxd7 Rxd7 26. Rd1 Rxd1 27. Nxd1 g5 (The exchanges helped Blacks position very little. Black realizes that if he does nothing, White will simply invade on the Queenside by pushing Blacks Knights off the board with b3-b4 and c4-c5, followed by a2-a4 and finally b4-b5, this will activate White's KB and bring him into the Q-side fight. Later perhaps even the White King will walk over there and help out. Notice the complete helplessness of the Black Bishop during those possible maneuvers. The recluse just stands in his corner and hides. The move 27...g5 also tells us the psychological turning point of the game. It shows us that Karaklajic has lost his patience.)

28. Nb2! gxf4 29. gxf4 Nc8 30. b4 Nd3 31. Nxd3 Bxd3 32. Bf1! (The strategic Battle is over the White's Knight has penetrated on the Queen-side. The question of the recluse is now a thing of the past. White wins a pawn and the game.) 32...Bxf1 33. Kxf1 b5 34. Nxc6 bxc4 35. Ke2 Kf8 36. Ke3 Ke8 37. Kd4 Kd7 38. b5 Kc7 39. Kxc4 a6 40. Nd4 (White is a pawn ahead and won the game in 17 moves.)

This game was valuable because it showed us the method that should be used against a recluse. The strategy was very clear and easy to understand. The hardest part of the game was recognizing that Black even had a recluse in his position. The move

The next example shows the weakness of a recluse in even more glaring a fashion:

The helpless recluse never moved after the sixth move. He could only watch the action from the other side of the board.

Be alert if your opponent has a recluse sock the "recluse strategy" to him, But make sure it's really a recluse. (And be sure you don't have one.)

HOW HIGH COULD FISCHER HAVE GONE?

One of the more interesting books on chess to be published recently is THE RATING OF CHESSPLAYERS by Arpad E. Elo. Close examination of professor Elo's statistics allows some very interesting speculation as to how high Bobby Fischer's rating might have gone, and also how long he might have laid valid claim to being the strongest chess player in the world.

Elo presents a composite curve of the development of thirty six chess masters whose ratings may be followed from age twenty one to age sixty five. p. 97 He calculates that the average increase in these thirty six players from age twenty one until they reached their peak was 120 rating points. This peak was reached at age thirty six.

He also presents a curve showing the development of Bobby Fischer from age fourteen until he discontinued serious play at twenty nine. At age twenty one according to the curve Fischer had a rating of about 2690. If one adds 120 points to that the result is 2810 at the age of thirty six.

Another approach is to calculate from the age of 29 to age 36. The composite curve shows the average of the thirty six masters to have increased about 20 rating points during those years. Fischer's rating at the time he ceased playing is listed as 2780. Adding 20 points to 2780 gives a peak of 2800 at age thirty six for Fischer. No one will ever be able to say precisely what might have happened, but it is this writer's conclusion that Bobby would have peaked at around 2810.

According to Elo's data Fischer passed the 2730 mark at the age of about 25. This would have given him the strongest rating in the world. If he followed the composite curve of the other thirty six masters it would have taken him until he was 50 years old to have dropped back down to the 2730 level. Unless some other player can rise above the 2730 level before Bobby reached the age of fifty the writer concludes he would have a reign of 25 years as the strongest player in the world.
