This issue of the Tennessee Chess News is being sent to all USCF members in Tennessee, including those who are currently not TCA members. There are around 250 players in this category. The idea is to acquaint these players with our organization and magazine. TCN has improved greatly over the years. We think we have something to offer all players of the game of chess, including tournament chess, match players of individual or team competition, club players, junior and postal players. Also, we have recently called attention to playing chess with mini-computers, which seems to be an excellent approach to promote chess among young people. (An improved version of Challenger 10 has just be-come available for only \$90.)

Another reason for sending this issue to all USCF members in our state is to call attention to the Tennessee Open, which again this year will be contested over the Labor Day weekend (September 1-3) in Nashville. (For details about site, registration, etc., please refer to the separate announcement in this issue.) This year we have introduced some innovations in the competition, particularly in the Amateur and Novice divisions. In these divisions we have added a team competition, the winner of which will receive a trophy. (Special rules covering this competition are also included on another page of this issue.) The "Uncle Bob Scrivener Team Plaque" has been offered for many years, but it has usually been dominated by players in the Open division. The new team trophies will give recognition to players who can field teams in the Amateur and Novice divisions. So, if you are a Class C or D player, here is your chance to get together a team from your club or city to compete for team honors in the Amateur division. Likewise, Class E and lower-rated players are invited to compete for the team trophy in the Novice division. At least four players are needed for a team. Another improvement this year will be the recognition of upsets with cash prizes where a player of much lower rating defeats a higher rated player. Also, the cash prizes awarded for brilliancy games have been increased (continued next page) to encourage more players to compete here.

It will be difficult to predict what the effect of the current energy will be on tournament activity. At the time this is written, the supply of gasoline appears to be adequate, and has not deterred chess players from competing in events it. Tennessee. Let me assure you that the TCA will do everything possible to assist you in finding the fuel you need. If you are still hesitant, may we recommend your considering a car pool with other players in your area. Also, other modes of transportation, such as bus or even air, are available. But I hope you will make every effort to compete in the Tennessee Open this year, and don't let the gas situation deprive you of the fun and excitement you will have by playing here over the Labor Day weekend.

TENNESSEE POSTAL CHESS by Stan Birmson

Why Postal Chess? I didn't receive any response to my question of why you play postal chess. Will hold open the question till the next issue. Remember, to the best set of reasons goes 10 post cards with postage suitable for postal chess play.

1979 Tennessee Postal Championship. Prize fund based on entries. All entry money returned in a cash prize fund to the top 3 finishers. Assignments are in 4-man sections with mixed classes. Play six games, 3 as white, 3 as black. Entry fee is \$3 per section and you may enter more than one section. TCA mambership is required. For more details see the April issue of TCN and/or writ Stan Bimson, Rt 2, Box 293, Hendersonville, TN 37075.

Postal Rules. As the rules state, you can use any printed material for assistance, game score or opening plays. But an opinion from a third party is not permitted — this would also apply to the modern day IC chess-playing machines (see last issue's fine report on the micro-chess computer). I personally have not found these computers much more than an "any time" opponent; most cannot even find the answer to a two- or three-move checkmate chess problem. Play your postal games by yourself, then analyze your game with the computer to see if it can play as well as you did!

This issue of Tennessee Chess News represents the largest mailing in the history of the magazine, as it is being sent not only to our paid subscrbers but to all USCF members (as of August 1978) in the state.

Regular subscribers will note that the issue is also 25% smaller than our normal issues (12 pages instead of 16). First, contrary to the opinion of Mr. Tsitseklis [see Letters], summer is a slack season in chess activity, and we have received very little to print since the last issue. Secondly, in order to stay within our budget, it was necessary to economize as much as possible.

The only material received by the deadline which was not published are games. Most of them will be published in the October issue.

This issue will probably reach most of you two weeks later than normal. For this the Editor assumes full responsibility: there was an extended vacation, illness, and just plain old laziness.

Well, it seems USCF's trials and tribulations have no end. The latest rumor has it that all the data they had naged to get erased, so it all has to become operational! This makes the tings are already at least six months out of date. Here in Tennessee

we have scores of players who have played dozens of rated tournament games but who are still listed as unrated. The inordinate delay in processing ratings is not only demoralizing to players, but makes it almost impossible for organizors and directors to make proper pairings in tournaments.

The Editor finds incomprehensible the rationale behind USCF's adoption of the new player-classification system to replace the one now in use (see CL&R, July 1979):

For years the chess community has been complaining about overinflation of ratings: now we have dumped on us an overinflated classification system. And, I suspect, this is only the beginning. First the modest but accurate "wife" became a "homemaker," then a "domestic engineer." By analogy, my modest 1605 Class B rating, magically transformed overnight to Candidate Expert, should in a year or two become New Improved Expert Candidate Super-Master, 2nd Class, with Oak Leaf Cluster.

Nothing we have published in the past two on the old computer tapes somehow ma-years elicited as much comment (all favorable) as our article on micro-chess combe retyped before the new computer can puters. We would like to publish one or more additional critical appraisals of these infamous 18 1/2-minute gap in the Nixon machines, but we need your assistance. If tapes look like Kindergarten stuff! Ra- you have a micro-chess computer, send us your impressions (or, better yet, objective evaluations) and a few illustrative games.

....I came away with a feeling of somewhat surprise and confusion by the sense of priorities for the matters discussed on the floor of the annual chess meeting at the Labor Day weekend of 1978.

True, the idea of polling members' feelings was quite innovative — the newly formed Knoxville Chess Club was started that way, and also seeing that more responsibility is placed on the shoulders of younger people. Yet, I feel, too much time was spendion how to improve the contents of our magazine....

There also seemed to be a considerable amount of talk about certain personnel problems in the USCF and bearing no relationship with our local problems. To a great extent, the local grass roots players are the USCF! So if we, as organizers..., do our best for the bottom part, the top part, or USCF, will always be in good shape.... In terms of top priority I did bring to the meeting the idea of reducing overall costs and to ensure fuller participation for this group [grade school and college students] that lacks a steady income.

In view of the above, I want to present at this time to all our members for our 1979 business meeting the following sets of proposals for a full consideration:

On Tournaments --

1. Organize a "Tennessee Closed Championship" annually in Nashville, in May or June, the winners to receive free entry in the Tennessee Open.

2. For both the Open and Closed Tournaments, coordinated efforts by all clubs to ensure full participation.

(a) Group travel to and from Nashville at little or no cost per person.

(b) Truly recreational places in or around Nashville should be obtained.. for tournament sites. For the estimated \$75 rental, two additional prizes could thus be saved up!

(c) Lodgings should be near the playing sites and should be obtained at a discount rate for doing wholesale business. Some local friends could also provide free shelter. With enough effort it can be done!

On Tennessee Chess News --

1. Summer time is very eventful in chess participation. I hereby propose that for an additional 50¢ a Special Summer Roundup issue should be formed, containing, among others, results of the closed tourney.

2. Add "Life-in-Clubs" feature with news of people from each club across the state. This promotes a better fellowship and better knowledge about people; also, delete some lower class games which have no commentaries.

3. Reserve a "Suggestion Corner" for all readers of the magazine.

In this day of rising costs, I sincerely hope and pray that, through unified effort from all of us, not chess popularity but fuller and more reasonable participation can be truly increased here in Tennessee.

Dear John,

Receiving several dozen state chess bulletins, I'm quite impressed with quality of your bulletin and extent of your coverage. It is a rare state chess association that has officers that literally reside from one end of the state to the other.

In your June, 1979, issue it was the "Cumberland County--Blueprint for Success" story by Talbot Rogers that prompted me to write this letter.

Aside from chess journalism, my prime interest the past 10 years has been in scholastic chess promotion. It is a shame that more teachers do not take a leadership role in forming chess clubs and scholastic leagues.

Harry Sabine, as your story states, found that the local news media can be a great ally in gaining acceptance (and funding!) for scholastic chess. Having one top player usually doesn't spur chess interest as much as a chess team that all students can set their sights. And don't underestimate the value of community leaders such as Harry! It takes student interest, teacher organization and parent support to make any scholastic chess program a success.

My own experience is that chess is most successfully introduced to students in grades six, seven and eight. Most students younger than 12 learn chess from parents rather than schoolmates. A student at age 12 or 13 is ready for the new competitive experience that chess provides.

I wish to encourage members of the Tennessee Chess Association to survey schools in their area to make sure that students are able to have a chess club if they desire one. Donation of a few chess sets is sometimes a powerful inducement to start a club.

And, while I'm discussing promotion, the best local chess promotion is a regular column in your daily or weekly newspaper. The Association of U.S. Chess Journalists is anxious to assist any player to start a local column.

Please tell your readers that I am willing to answer questions on chess journalism and scholastic chess promotion, and that they can have copies of my guides on these subjects if they send a stamped envelope my way.

PROPOSED NEW CHARTER OF THE TENNESSEE CHESS ASSOCIATION

- 1. The name of the corporation is TENNESSEE CHESS ASSOCIATION.
- 2. The duration of the corporation is perpetual.
- The address of the principal office of the corporation in the state of Tennessee shall be 2609 Sailboat Court, Nashville, TN., 37217, County of Davidson.
- 4. The corporation is not for profit.
- 5. The purposes for which the corporation is organized are:

(a) To broaden and develop chess as art and recreation as a significant element of culture in the State of Tennessee. The Association will work toward this end by instruction of the public on a subject useful to the individual for the purpose of improving or developing his capabilities in the game of chess. The Association will conduct public discussion groups, formuns, panels, lectures and other forms of public education in schools and other public places. The Association will cooperate with chess clubes, schools, and other groups and institutions throughout Tennessee in teaching chess and conducting tournaments.

(b) To initiate programs, conduct tournaments and matches and to employ methods that will tend be promote the literacy and educational benefits to be derived from the game of chess.

(c) To receive donations from the general public to enable the Association to conduct chess matches and tournaments and to award trophies and prizes to successful contestants.

(d) In addition to the foregoing purposes, the Association shall have for its purpose the doing of each and every act or thing which a corporation may be permitted to do under the laws of the State of Tennessee.

- 6. The corporation is to have members.
- 7. The Association is organized exclusively for educational purposes, including for euch purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as emerged organizations under Section 501 (c) 00 ftm Internal Revenue Code of 1954 or the corresponding provisions of any future United States Internal Revenue Law.
- 8. No part of the net earnings of the Association shalls insure to the benefit of, or be distributable to its members, directors, officers, or other private persons, except that the Association shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the corporate purposes, and except that trophies and prizes awarded in the course of the Association's educational and promotignal program shall not be so contrived. No substantial part of the activities of the Association, and the contribution of propagata, or otherwise attempting to influence legislation, and the distribution of statements, any politic affectives of any cardidate and public office. Notwithstanding any other provisions of this charter, the Association.

shall not carry on any other activities not permitted to be carried on: (a) by a corporation exempt from Federal Income Tax under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1984 or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law, or: (b) by a corporation, contributions to which are deductible under Section 170 (c) (2) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1984 or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law.

9. Upon the dissolution of the Association, the Board of Directors shall, after paying or making provision for the payment of all of the liabilities of the Association, dispose of all the assets of the Association exclusively for the purposes of the corporation in such manner, or to such organization, or organizations, organizat and operated seclusively for charitable, educational, religious, or scientific purposes as shall at that time qualify as an exempt organization, or organizations of 10 (c) (3) of the Internal Reverue Code of 1964, or the corresponding provision of any future United States Internal Revenue Law, as the Board of Directors shall determine.

10. The Association shall not discriminate as to membership on the basis of race, religion, age, sex or national or ethnic origin.

11. At all meetings of the members of the Association, one-tenth (1/10) of the members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum. At all meetings of the Board of Directors of the Association, one-third (1/3) of the Directors then in office shall constitute a quorum.

Notes to Proposed New Charter by Secretary-Treasurer Harry D. Sabine

- Sections 1-4 are essentially the same as the Old Charter except for dropping the "Inc." from the name.
- Section 5 has been re-written to restate our purposes in accordance with IRS requirements for a 501 (c) (3) organization.
- 3. Section 6 is required by Tennessee Law.
- 4. Sections 7-10 are added to comply with IRS requirements for a 501 (c) (3) organization.
- Section 11 changes the quorum requirements at meetings to the minimum permissable under Tennessee Law. A quorum must be a majority under Tennessee Law unless otherwise stated in the Charter.

BY-LAWS OF THE TENNESSEE CHESS ASSOCIATION

ARTICLE I - MEMBERSHIP

<u>Section I - Eligibility</u>. Any person, regardless of residence, race, religion, age, sex, or national or ethnic origin may become a member of the Association by paying dues.

Section 2 - Rights and Privileges, Any member whose dues are current st joy full privileges in the Association, including the right to vote and hold

Section 3 - Dues. The annual dues for each member shall be four dollars (\$4.00). Dues shall be payable annually and shall be due on September 1 of each year. However, any preson who joins the Association between April 1 and August 31 of each year shall have the option of paying two dollars (\$2.00) which shall entitle him to a membership which expires on August 31 of the same year in which he pays the dues or may pay five dollars (\$5.00) which shall entitle him to a membership which expires on August 31 of the same year in which he pays the object of the same shall have the payable of the same shall entitle him to a membership which expires on August 31 of the same. Each additional person in the same family may become a member by paying dues in the amount of fifty cents (\$0.50) which shall entitle such person to all the rights and privileges of membership except that such person shall not receive a subscription to the Newsletter published by the Association.

Section 4 - Termination. Any member who is more than one month delinquent in payment of his dues shall be automatically dropped from the membership rolls.

ARTICLE II - MEETINGS

Section I - Annual Meeting. The annual meeting of the membership of the Association shall be held in conjunction with the Tennessee Open Chess Tournament at such specific time and place as may be set by the board of directors.

Section 2 - Special Meetings. Special meetings of the membership of the Association may be called by the president, the board of directors, or by not less that one-tenth (1/10) of the members of the Association.

Section 3 - Notice of Meeting. Written or printed notice stating the place, day and hour of the meeting, and, in the case of a special meeting, the purpose or purposes for which the meeting is called and the person or persons calling the meeting, shall be delivered either personally or by mall to each member entitled meeting, shall be delivered of the meeting in meeting. If malled, such notice shall be delivered not less than on (10) do meeting. If malled, such notice shall be delivered not less than on (10) do before the date of the meeting and shall be deemed to be delivered when deposited in the United States Mail addressed to the member at his address as it appears on the memberahip books of the Association, with postage thereon paid.

Section 4 - Quorum. At any meeting of members one-tenth (1/10) of the members entitled to vote shall constitute a quorum.

Section 5 - Proxies. Every member entitled to vote at a meeting of members may authorize another person or persons to act for him by proxy. Every proxy must be signed by the member or by his duly authorized atterney in fact. Such proxy



shall be filed with the Secretary-Treasurer of the Association before or ... the

Section 6 - Order of Business. The order of business at all membership meetings shall be determined by the board of directors.

Section 7 - Rules of Procedure. Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the pro-

ARTICLE III - BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Section 1 - General Powers. The business and affairs of the Association shall be managed by its board of directors, each of whom shall be of legal age. The directors shall describe the same and they may adopt such rules and regulations for the conduct for the conduct management of the Association, as they may deem proper, not inconsistent with these bytakes and the laws of the State of Tennessee.

Section 2 - Number and Composition. The board of directors shall consist of nine members of which the duly elected and acting president, vice president, secretary-treasurer, newsletter editor, postal chess coordinator, and tournament coordinator shall be ex officio members.

Section 3 - Election and Qualification. The directors who are ex officio members of the board shall be elected and shall hold office as provided in Article I/O of these bylaws. The three directors who are not ex officio members of the board shall be elected at the annual membership meeting and shall hold office until the next annual meeting of the membership and with their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Each of the three directors shall reside in a different grand division of the state with one director being from East, Middle, and West Tennessee, respectively.

Section 4 - Regular Meetings. A regular meeting of the board of directors shall be held without other notice than this bylaw immediately after, and at the same place as the annual meeting of members. Other regular meeting of directors may be held at such time and place and upon such notice as the directors may prescribe.

Section 5 - Special Meetings. Special meetings of the board of directors may be called by the president on by any three (3) directors upon notice sent by any usual means of communication not less than five (5) days before the meeting.

Section 6 - Quorum. At any meeting of directors one third of the direct in office shall constitute a quorum.

Section 7 - Manner of Acting. The act of a majority of the directors pr at a meeting at which a quorum is present shall be the act of the board.

Section 8 - Vacancies, Vacancies occurring in the board for any reason may be filled by a vote of a majority of the directors then in office. A director elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected to hold office for the unexpired term of his predecessor.

Section 9. - Compensation. No compensation shall be paid to directors for their services except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses as approved by the board. This provision shall not preclude a director from receiving a tournament director's fee for directing a tournament sposored by the Association.

Section 10 - Action by Written Consent. The board of directors may take any action permitted under the charter of the Association or these bylaws by written the action so taken, and signed by of the directors entitled to vote thereon.

ARTICLE IV - OFFICERS

Section 1 - Number. The officers of the Association shall be a president, a vice-president, a secretary-treasurer, a newsletter editor, a postal chess co-ordinator and a tournament coordinator.

Section 2. * Election and Coalifications. All officers shall be elected at the annual meeting of the membership and shall hold office until their successors are elected and shall qualify. No more than three of the officers of the Association shall reside in the same grand division of the state.

Section 3 - Terure, All officers shall be elected for two (2) year terms. The president, secretary—treasurer, and newsletter editor shall be elected at the arrual meetings of the membership held in odd-numbered years. The vice president, postal chees coordinator, and bournament coordinator shall be elected at the arrual meetings of the membership held in even numbered years.

Section 4 - Vacancies. Vacancies occurring in any office for any reason may be filled by a majority of the directors then in office. An officer elected to fill a vacancy shall be elected to hold office for the unexpired term of his prede-

Section 5 - Duties of Officers.

- (a) The President:
 - (1) shall preside at all meetings of the membership.
 - (2) shall be chairman of and preside at all meetings of the board of directors.
 - (3) shall appoint all committees.
 - (4) shall be the chief executive officer of the Association and, subject to the control of the board of directors, shall in general supervise and control all of the business and affairs of the Association.
- (b) The Vice President:
 - shall perform all of the duties of the president in the event of the president's death, absence, or inability or refusal to act.



- (2) shall perform such other duties as from time to time may be assigned to him by the president.
- (c) The Secretary-Treasurer:
 - (1) shall keep the minutes of all membership and director's meetings in one or more books provided for that purpose and shall see that all notices are duly given in accordance with the provisions of these bylaws.
 - (2) shall be custodian of all records of the Association and shall keep a record of the names and addresses of all members.
 - (3) shall collect all dues.
 - (4) shall have charge and custody of and be responsible for all funds of the Association, and shall deposit all such funds in a bank.
 - (5) shall make disbursements as authorized by the board of directors.
 - (6) shall make a financial report at the annual membership meeting and shall make such other financial reports as the board of directors shall determine.
 - (7) shall give a bond for the faithful discharge of his duties in such sum and with such surety or sureties as the board of directors shall determine
- (d) The Newsletter Editor:
 - (1) shall be editor in chief of the newsletter of the Association.
 - (2) shall direct the publication and distribution of the newsletter at least six (6) times per year.
 - (3) shall operate within the budget as set by the board of directors.
 - (4) shall appoint all necessary subordinate editors of the newsletter.
 - (5) shall make a report at the annual membership meeting.
- (e) The Postal Chess Coordinator:
 - (1) shall direct and coordinate postal chess activities for the Association.
- (2) shall operate within the budget as set by the board of directors.
 - (3) shall submit to the newsletter editor appropriate material for publication in the newsletter.
 - (4) shall be responsible for ensuring that all postal chess players are members of the Association.
 - (5) shall make a report at the annual membership meeting.

- (f) The Tournament Coordinator:
 - (1) shall be a certified USCF tournament director.
 - (2) shall be responsible for coordinating all tournaments sponsored by the Association.
 - (3) shall maintain a list of all certified USCF tournament directors in the State of Tennessee.
 - (4) shall be in charge of coordinating all major tournaments held in Ternessee so as to avoid conflicts in dates according to USCF suggested guidelines and shall serve as USCF trumament clearinghouse for Ternessee.
 - (5) shall make a report at the annual membership meeting.

Section 6 - Compensation. No compensation shall be paid to officers for their services except for reimbursement for reasonable expenses as approved by the board of directors. This provision shall not preclude an officer from receiving a tournament director's fee for directing a tournament aponsored by the Association.

ARTICLE V - TOURNAMENTS

Section 1 - Ternessee Open. The Association shall sponsor the Ternessee Open Chess Tournament each year to be held on the Labor Day weekend at such site and upon such terms and conditions as the board of directors shall determine.

Section 2 - Tennessee Scholastic Championships. The Association shall sponsor the Tennessee Scholastic Championship Tournament each year to determine the Tennessee High School, Jurion High and Elementary champions. Such tournament shall be held at such time and place and upon such terms and conditions as the board of directors shall determine.

Section 3 - Other Tournaments. The Association shall sponsor such other tournaments each year as the board of directors shall from time to time determine.

ARTICLE VI - UNITED STATES CHESS FEDERATION

Section 1 - Affiliation. This Association shall be affiliated with the United States Chess Federation.

Section 2 - USCF Delegates, Alternates, and Voting Members, All USCF delegates, alternates or voting members allocated to the State of Ternesses shall be elected by the membership of the Association at the annual membership meeting. The Association will relimbures at least one delegate to the annual USCF business meeting part of their expenses in attending such meeting. Such refirmbursement shall be in such amount as the board of directors shall determine.

ARTICLE VII - FISCAL YEAR

The fiscal year of the Association shall begin on the first day of September in each year.

ARTICLE VIII - COMMITTEES

The President shall determine and appoint the proper standing and special committees and shall designate their duties.

ARTICLE IX - AMENDMENT

These bylaws may be altered, amended or repealed and new bylaws may be adopted by a majority vote of the members present at any membership meeting at which a quorum is present or by a majority vote of the board of directors at any meeting at which a quorum is present.

Notes to Proposed New Bylaws by Secretary-Treasurer Harry Sabine

The proposed new bylaws have been completely re-written as to form and sequence but do not contain many major changes from the current ones. The major changes are as follows:

- (1) Quorums are changed to agree with the proposed new Charter.
- (2) The Board of Directors is increased from six (6) to nine (9) members by adding three (3) new directors, one each to come from East, Middle and West Tennessee. The three (3) new directors are to serve one (1) year terms.
- (3) The method of filling vacancies in any office is changed so that all vacancies shall be filled by the Board of Directors, with the new director filling the unexpired term of his predecessor.
 - (4) A surety bond is to be required of the Treasurer.
- (5) The procedure for amendment is changed so that the bylaws may be amended by a majority vote of the members or by the majority vote of the Board of Directors.

RULES FOR TEAM COMPETITION IN

THE AMATEUR AND NOVICE SECTIONS

(TENNESSEE OPEN)

- 1. A Team shall consist of 4 persons, no more or no less, and shall represent only one city, club or county in the State of Tennessee.
- A list of team members must be submitted to the tournament director by the end of registration for the tournament.
- Each team shall designate a team captain who shall have the authority to act on behalf of the team.
- Any city, club or county may enter more than one team.
- Team members must be a member of the club they represent or must reside in the city or county being represented by them.
- 6. All team members must play in the same section.
- 7. Team members will not be paired against each other during the tournament unless the tournament director deems it necessary in order to reasonably comply with the swiss system rules.
- 8. Team scores at the end of the tournament shall be determined by adding the individual scores of the four team members. Any team member who withdraws from the tournament shall be counted as a "O" score. If two teams tie for first, the cumulative tie break system on the team score will be used to determine the winner of the trophy.
- 9. The tournament director shall have the absolute authority to resolve any disputes over eligibility of team members, pairings, scores, or any other matters involving the team competition.
- 10. Any player competing on a team in the novice or amateur sections will also be eligible to compete on a team for the Scrivener team plaque.
