In this probably long overdue editorial I first wish to thank Harry Sabine for his work in the organization and direction of the East Tennessee Regional Tournament. The turnout was excellent, and all arrangements had been made without a single problem. I also want to commend Fairfield Glade for providing us with an excellent tournament site as well as beautiful condominiums to stay in. I would like to suggest to all tournament organizers that they consider Fairfield Glade as a possible site for future tournaments. I know of no other facilities in the state which are any better, and few which are even comparable.

Second, I want to inform you that my term ends on Labor Day, as does that of the Secretary Treasurer, and the Editor. This means that we are seeking nominations for new officers. Anyone who is interested in running for a T.C.A. office or who would like to nominate anyone else for an office please get your nominations in early to either me or Pete Lahde so that we can have some kind of ballot ready for Labor Day.

Third, and probably most important, Pete tells me that he will be retiring as Editor of the Tennessee Chess News in a year or two. He needs to find an assistant who will eventually take over full editorship. If you know of anyone with the qualification and dedication to do this job, please let us know as soon as possible.

I would like to take time out here to say a few words about Peter Lahde. The organization will miss him tremendously. When I first began to play chess, for all entents and purposes, Peter Lahde was the Tennessee Chess Association. When no one else seemed to be interested, he published and edited the magazine, organized and ran the Tennessee Open, corresponded with organizations throughout the state, and generally kept the organization from disappearing completely. Especially his work with the Tennessee Chess News has been worthy of great admiration. I have worked for a while with the U.T. Chess News letter, and I know the amount of work that goes into producing such a magazine. Pete has put out T.C.N. single handed for as long as I can remember, and we should all be very grateful for his work.

Finally I would like to discuss the <u>Tennessee Junior Championship</u>. I have heard much interest expressed in a tournament of this sort. I would like to make a discussion of this idea part of the agenda of our Labor Day annual meeting, so please come prepared with suggestions about such a tournament.

REGIONAL EVENTS HAVE MIXED SUCCESS By Peter Lande

The <u>East Tennessee Championship</u> was by far the most successful tournament of the three "regional" events held. It attracted forty-six players. While the largest USCF membership in Tennessee resides in East Tennessee perhaps this is not surprising. But East Tennessee also drew the highest percentage with 21%. The Middle Tennessee event with only 29 players had, of course, a smaller turnout than expected. This represents about 18% of the USCF membership for that region. To achieve 21% participation would have meant only five more players. But very disappointing was the small turnout from West Tennessee. Here only 18 players were ready to do battle. This represents about 14% of the USCF membership for that region. Twenty-seven players would have been needed to achieve the 21% participation

acheived in East Tennessee.

Why was the participation lower in <u>Middle Tennessee</u> and even more so for <u>West Tennessee?</u>
We don't have all the answers yet but should have a better idea by the time the Tennessee
Open comes around. In West Tennessee it appeared that the lack of participation by the lower
sections may have been at least partially responsible. But even though, the players from
West Tennessee were not discouraged and talked already about the next "regionals". Of course,
they felt that some changes would be needed to attract a larger number. But also surprising
was the absence of some of the "favorites" in all three regions who would have had a chance
to qualify.

TSITSEKLIS AND RICKMAN QUALIFY FROM EAST

Emanuel Tsitseklis of Knoxville made it seem easy as he qualified for the Tennessee Championship by sweeping all five games. Not quite as an easy time had Joe Rickman of Maryville who scored 4-1. (He lost to third place finisher George Jamison of Knoxville.) He had to wait til all the tiebreaks were figured as five other players equalled his score. They were in this order after Joe: 3rd Jamison, 4th Kenny Simpson, 5th Mark Wagner, 6th Charles Laws, and 7th Wayne Kendrick. Forty-sic players competed in this event.

Besides the two qualifiers (Tsitseklis and Rickman) there were thse Class Champions: Class B Richard Carpenter, Class C - George Jamison, Class D - Wayne Kendrick and Class E - Ernie Warner. The event took place June 11-12 in Crossville. TCA President Mack Garner directed assisted by Harry Sabine.

CURT JONES AND ROBINSON TIE IN MIDDLE TENN.

Henry Robinson of Clarksville and Curt Jones of Nashville topped a field of twenty-nine players in the Middle Tennessee Championship. They both won four and and drew each other. Henry took the first place trophy on tiebreak. This of course, gives Robinson and Jones the qualifying spots from Middle Tennessee. Five players scored $3\frac{1}{2}$ points allowing all these players to share in the Class B or Class C prize money. They placed in this order: 3rd Jerry Wheeler, 4th Marcus Stinson, 5th Billy Anderson, 6th David Freitag, and 7th Guy Kooi.

The following players became Class Champions: Class B: Jerry Wheeler; Class C Billy Anderson, Class D Ronald Edge, Class E/unr: Bryant Penuel. These players were awarded a trophy in addition to cash prizes. The event was held in Nashville June 11-12. TCA Editor Peter Lahde Directed.

MAHLON SMITH AND JAMES RACKLEY TO REPRESENT THE WEST

Mahlon Smith (1869) and James Rackley (1656) will be the representatives from West Tennessee in the Tennessee State Championship. Mahlon Smith gave up only one draw to score $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ to be the West Tennessee Champion. The second place went surprisingly to James Rackley, a Class B player, with a 4-1 score. He outscored two Class A players, Philip Morgan (1880) and Robert Felt (1857), who had 3-2 scores to place third and fourth. James Rackley was the only Class B player from any region to qualify. All other players were Class A players.

There were these Class Champions: Class B James Rackley, Class C Tom Olsen, and Class E/Unr Dick Chiles. In addition John Hurt won the second place Class B prize money. The event was held in Memphis and attracted 18 players.

MARTY APPLEBERRY WINS KING COTTON

Master Marty Appleberry won the very strong KING COTTON OPEN held in Memphis on May 6-8. He scored $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ giving up a draw to Ruth Orton of Arkansas, who is now rated as an expert. John Hurt (1757) had 4-1 to place second after tiebreak ahead of four experts who also had 4-1. They were: 3rd Robert Ilderton, 4th Ruth Orton, 5th Bruce Baker (Dela.) and 6th Bill Orton. The event was directed by Arthur Hager for the Memphis Chess Club. There was a good turnout for this event with 42 players. (Results and crosstable received for this event by James Little)

JAMES COBB WINS CUMBERLAND OPEN

James Cobb of Chattanooga was the winner of the 14th Cumberland County Open with a score of $3\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$. Second place went to Frank Larimer (Oak Ridge), Mark Wiley (Crossville), and Ernest Atkeison, Jr (Somerville). They all shared in the Class D prize money. Robert Young was the Unrated prize winner. Fifteen players took part. The event was directed by Harry Sabine, who also furnished the results to TCN.

ROBINSON WINS SMYRNA EVENT

Henry Robinson finished with a score of $3\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ to win the Mid TN May Open in Smyrna. Trevor Cook placed second with $2\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$, drawing with Robinson but losing to Cornwell. Four players had 2-2 scores in this order: 3rd Marcus Stinson, 4th Ron Yoder. 5th Tom Farr, and Glenn Cornwell. Jody Landrum and expert Bruce Baker of Dela. (who only played one game) had one point each. The average rating with 1668 was quite strong for this event. Marcus Stinson directed for MCCA.

Curt Jones, representing the South in the National HS Championships in Cleveland, made a respectable showing by scoring 6-2 (4 wins, 4 draws). Curt is one of two players from Nashville who tied for first in the Southern H.S. tourney. The other qualifier, Jerry Wheeler, chose not to go to Cleveland. Two games, with Curt's own annotation from Cleveland are included in this issue.

Two club tourneys in Memphis were held during April and May. In the first Class Flight section Philip Morgan was first with $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ in this 13 player event. The Tourist Flight section was won by James Clark with $4\frac{1}{2}$. Fifteen players entered.

Kent Meadows informs us that Tibor Varga, formerly of Nashville but now living in Chicago, recently lost his wife to cancer. Our sincere sympathy to Tibor. On the brighter side we read recently in CL&R that Tibor had won a strong tourney in Chicago with 5-0. As a result his rating is now well into Class B with 1701.

An 11-year old British schoolboy has made chess history by becoming the youngest qualifier ever for a national championship final. Nigel Short won the right to join 35 other chess experts at the British final in August by beating the 1976 Irish Champion Alan Ludgate in a northwest England zonal playoff match.

Nigel takes the youth record from the legendary Cuban player Capablanca, who first

Tenn. residency is not required but we do require that for the first year of this postal tournament that you subscribe to TCN which will keep you up-to-date on this tournament's preliminary round. This subscription (TCA membership) is also \$3.00 (per yr,) and should be sent with your entry fee. First entry, earliest postmark, noting this ad will receive a free TCA membership for '78.

-SOME GOOD ADVICE FOR THE NOVICE -If a hostile knight is harassing your king, place the king on a diagonal from that

knight with one square intervening. The knight cannot then check you in less than three

Never forget you have an opponent, and become so engrossed in your own plans that you overlook what he is up to. Always ask yourself, when your opponent makes a move 'why did he do that?" You may find you can ignore his threats for the moment; on the other hand, you may have to attend to them at once.

Bring your knights and bishops out first and aim at controlling the four squares in the center of the board.

Don't let your opponent distract you by offers of trivial pawns. After you have won a pawn, even if the position is even, you are still a long way from a win, whereas, if your pieces are well and powerfully placed, you can often crash through to a clear win in the middle game. Develop!

Having decided on your move and when you are just about to make it, take a quick glance around the board to make sure you are not making a simple blunder, leaving a piece free to be captured for nothing or overlooking something similarly urgent.

Don't play too many games at once, especially if you are losing them and feeling a little discouraged. Stop!

Always try to play against somebody slightly better than yourself. (From CHESS, Dec. 1935, which was good advice then and is still today)

MORE ON THE FIRST TENNESSEE OPEN By Peter Lahde

The current USCF President of the United States Chess Federation was very active during the forties promoting chess activity in many parts of the country. This included his directing of the first Tennessee Open at Oak Ridge over Memorial Day weekend in 1947. So I wrote him a letter asking him if he would like to share with the readers of TENNESSEE CHESS NEWS his experiences with us of those days and also include a game of the blindfold exhibition he gave at that time. I am very happy to report that he readily complied by sending a very nice letter and also a game from the blindfold exhibition. Here is the letter and after it follows the game from the simultaneous:

Dear Mr. Lahde:

May 21, 1977

I have just returned from an out-of-town trip and found your letter of May 8th. Copy of Tennessee Chess News was received today. Thank you very much! You are doing an outstanding job.

I knew Messrs. Southern, Sullivan, Coveyou, Noderer and Somers very well as I gave a number of exhibitions in Tennessee a few years in a row. I am delighted to have been helpful in the founding of the Tennessee Chess Association and treasure the friendship of many of the chess players.

Enclosed you will find a copy of a game played in Oak Ridge at a blindfold exhibition exactly thirty (30) years ago. This game appeared in my book entitled ADVENTURES OF A CHESS-MASTER, now out-of-print and has become a collector's item.

Good luck in all your continued chess activities and endeavors.

Now for the game from the blindfold exhibition and the introduction in the book preceding the game:

ATOM BOMB!

I seemed to be one the few Americans who never had any trouble getting into Oak Ridge, Tennessee. No, I know nothing about physics and even less about atoms. The reason for my ease of entry was that Oak Ridge had developed a fine chess club, one which I have visited several times. This group organized the first Tennessee Championship during the Memorial Day weekend of 1947. Forty players vied for the State title, and I closed the proceedings by playing the 8 highest scorers blindfold on the afternoon of June 1, 1947. The result convinced me that I was not yet ready to retire, for I won 4 and drew 4 against this first-class field.

The text looks simpler.
- (f) White's resignation is a bit premature, but in view of what has happened his state of mind is easy to understand. This game allowed Laws to tie for second in the East Tennessee regionals.

Over the Memorial Day weekend I participated in the U.S. Championship for the Blind in Westfield, N.J. I finished second with a score of 4-1, one half point out of first place, I drew the eventual winner Jim Slagle, a computer scientist from Bethesda, Md. and the defending champion John Manetta. I also defeated a former champion Al Sandrin from Chicago, who is still an expert. Here is my game with Slagle:

- (a) Timid and bad, I didn't know the line or I would have played 5 P-QR3 BxN 6 BxB N-KB3 7 PxBP NxP 8 BxP R-N1 9 B-Q4 N-QB3 10 N-B1 with White on top according to Gligoric.
- (b) Still shy. After this the center collapses. Better 8 P-KB4 to hold the center or 8 PxP with the idea of N-Q6.
- (c) Desperation my center is crumbling. I can't stop ...B-R3 and ...P-B3 will give Black a pawn roller.
- (d) 14...P-B3! and "Black is beautiful". I play the French, too, and I dream about positions like this for Black.
- (e) Weak moves lead to bad consequences. 15...N-K2 16 P-R6 P-N3 (otherwise 17 PxP KxP 18 Q-R6) 17 BxB QxB 18 Q-N5 P-B3 19 PxP. I could get a line a little like this anyway, but thought I had better.
- (f) Everyone (including both players) thought Black was lost here, but everyone was wrong.
- (g) The basic problem all through here is the threat of ...QxPch ...Q-B5ch, Q-K5ch and Q-KN5ch. There appears to be no way out of the perpetual. Black's last move threatened K-N2 and R-R1.
- (h) I really underestimated this. Now White has no attack. Black still threatens R-R1.
- (i) 17 R-Q4 (or 27 R-R4) R-R1 28 R-B4ch K-N4 drops a Rook.
- (j) 31 K-B1 R-QN1 could hurt.
- (k) Mutual time pressure. After 32...R-QN1 33 Q-R3 Black is better, but I have chances for attack.

- (a) This much was played within a minute apiece, for this is all "book". I had a suspicion that he had some innovation prepared, for the line is considered somewhat better for white. I like novelties to be played, but only with my pieces! At this point, from the manner of his own movement of the piece, I knew I had walked into a variation that was, perhaps, prepared for a week. If for no other reason, move 15...Rh8 can be considered good because it is an aggressive originality.
- (b) When playing against a novelty, I try to look for any unusual move or plan, something not obvious that would not have been considered in home analysis. Here, the deployment of the rook on g3 is sound and probably unexplored by my opponent.
- (c) Is Black's activity of pieces worth a pawn? I have lived through the novelty!
- (d) I had no idea of what he was planning to do with the knight, I shall try never to miss such a conception again!
- (e) Threatens to capture on g4.
- (f) A shot from nowhere, yet how obvious it looks now.
- (g) A mistake. Better seems 37. Rxh4 Nd5ch 38 Kd3 Rxh4 39 g5 with a few chances, although Black's knight is domination.
- (h) After spending twenty minutes here, I decided that Black actually stands better, even though White's King appears strong it really cannot do much. A line I looked at ran: 41... Rg6 42 Rf3 Rg7 43 Bf8 Rh7 and White cannot do much on the Kingside, but Black still has a King and two queenside pawns to employ! I was well satisfied that he agreed to my offer of the draw.
