- (a) Whassat? This move loads to the type of chess ideally suited to White's style. Also, the youthful Black player may be led astray in its numerous traps. Objectively speaking, however, it gives Black the better game by force.
- (b) Black is "mixing it" with a player who thrives on active positions. So why give hime one? 5...P-K4 gives black the more active game and a pawn to boot.
- (c) A trap here is 7. B-K2 (to provent the maneuver in the game), BxN; 8. BxB,Q-K4ch and 9...QxR.
- (d) All according to black's plan initiated on his 5th move. The resulting position is very interesting, particularly since black has forced it. It's characteristics are as follows:
 - (1) White has the two bishops in an open position, a lead in development, and open KN and QR files.
 - (2) White has weak pawns all over the board, while black's position has no organic weaknesses.
 - (3) Black's queen is misplaced at his K3. He is behind in development and will fall further behind in bringing his queen to safety.
 - (4) White's QP is free to advance, while black's KP cannot.
- (e) It is critically important to get castled as soon as possible.
- (f) White is using his lead in development to effect. Note that 10...N-R3 is answered by 11. RxN!
- (g) 12. P-B5 and 13. NxP was the threat.
- (h) In driving black's queen to a more secure square, white only eases black's game. Also, White's Q5 is now quite weak, as the sequel shows. Much better was 12. P-Q4, since the threat of 13. P-Q5 followed by 14. B-K3 is very strong, e.g.
 - (1) 12...B-N2? 13 B-K3!, Q-Q1 (otherwise 14 P-Q5 is even stronger) 14. P-Q5, N-K4 (NxQP; 15 PxN, BxR; 16 QxB and White wins); 15. RxP and White wins a P.
 (2) 12...P-K3!; 13 P-Q5, BxPch; 14. K-B1 and the position is unclear.
- (i) Now that black has castled, he has much the better game.
- (j) An alternative is 18...NxB; 19 PxN, Q-R5ch; 20 K-B1, PxP; 21. PxP, B-R3, etc.
- (k) White may be lost already, but after this move there is no doubt any longer. 21. R-Q1 sooms necessary, but even then simply 21...KR-K1 gives black all the play.
- (1) On any other move ... KR-K1 is still the killer.
- (m) Black is the exchange up and has by far the better game. The rest is a matter of technique. Winner Jones effects the kill with a minimum of strain.

We can chalk up black's error in the opening to inexperience. The rest is an impressive effort by Youngster Jones!
