

#### A LESSON IN ALGEBRAIC



The United States Chess Federation(USCF) in its August 1972 meeting, decided to start an "educational campaign to teach chess players the algebraic notation. Chess Life & Review started this campaign with a short article in its January, 1973, issue.

The horizontal ranks are numbered 1-8, starting from the rank nearest white. The verticle files are lettered <u>a</u> to <u>h</u> from left to right (white) and right to left (black). "Check" is shown by + instead of ch. Pawn captures are given by naming the two files involved. Pawn moves show only the file. Captures are usually indicated by ":" instead of the "x".

The following example shows a game first in the algebraic notation and then the English descriptive.

### A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE MEMPHIS CHESS CLUB By John Hurt

The MEMFHIS CHESS AND CHECKER CLUB was founded in 1900 just after a simultaneous exhibition by Pillsbury. It was originally sponsored by the Business Mens Club and later by the Chamber of Commerce when the latter replaced the dusiness mens Club. There were 125 members at the peak of membership. The members used to play after meetings of the Chamber of Commerce. Later the Chess Club met at 1028 Falls Building every afternoon from 1:30 to 5:00 PM. In August of 1913, B. B. Jefferson won the 14th Annual Western Open Chess Championship and as this was a repeat of his triumph of the preceding year in Chicago, he was given permanent custody of the trophy. R. S. Scrivener was 5th in this very strong tourney. Jefferson was Southern Champion for 40 years between 1912 and 1952. R. S. Scrivener won his 1st Memphis title in 1905, and repeated many times until he won again in 1955 - - 50 years later! J. W. Fry of Charleston, west Virginia, attended the 1913 tournament in Memphis and the present City Champion, John F. Hurt, lived next door to Fry when a boy in grade school. Memphis won a radio match over New Orleans in this period. The New Orleans Chess Club had a waiting list of over 1,000 for membership in those days, when their most famous player was Paul Morphy, the World Champion. The Memphis Chess Club has been host to many famous players, over the years, such as Pillsbury in 1900, and Emanuel Lasker in 1907 when he won three of his World Championship match games over Frank Marshall, the American Champion. Other famous chess personalities that visited the Club here were Capablanca, Mieses and Maroczy. Rosa Jefferson, sister of B. B. Jefferson, edited a chess column in the Sunday Commercial Appeal for years. She drew with Emanuel Lasker in his Simultaneous Exhibition here. R. A. McDonald of Memphis won from Lasker in this same Exhibition. In 1915. Jefferson was selected as one of 8 Champions to play in the master's Tournament in New York for the Championship of Great Britain, America, Cuba, and Canada.

Editors note: Your editor will follow up on this article with a more recent history of the Memphis Chess Club. Also we plan to publish an account of the first city tourney in Nashville. We also want to publish a history of the Tenn. Open in the near future. But at the present time information before 1954 is quite sketchy. Can anyone help?

TENNESSEE HAS OVER 430 USCF MEMBERS

According to USCF Tennessee has now more than 430 members. At a cost of 3¢ per label TCA has purchased labels with addresses of all Tennessee players. TCA has made copies of this list which is available to any affiliation in Tennessee for \$1 by writing to the Editor. Anyone interested in making an alphabetical mailing list from these labels is invited to do so. TCA will pay \$5 to anyone who will make such a list. The growth of USCF in Tennessee parralells that for all of the United States. Here are some interesting statistics of Tenn. membership increasing in USCF. In 1959 Tenn. had 27 members which grew to 51 in 1961. In 1965 there were 63. 1969 - 118 members; 1970 - 129; 1971 - 192; April 1972 - 227 members and as of December 1972 - 430 members including affiliations. DID YOU KNOW that according to a recent Harris Poll 18% of the U.S. population knows how to play chess.

GARNER LEADS 4th ETSU SWEEP FOR UTCC By Charles Clifford

The 4th ETSU Open in Johnson City was highly successful for a University of Tenn. contingent which made the trip from Knoxville on January 13 as Mack Garner, Rick white, and Charles Clifford swept the top three places. The tournament consisted of seven four-man sections playing in round robin style. The top eight from the seven sections competed in an elimination speed tournament. In the quadrangulars Garner won his section with a  $2\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$  while white and Clifford tied in their section with  $2\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$  scores with Clifford winning the trophy on a coin flip.

## SABINE SEIZES CUMBERLAND COUNTY CROWN By Mark Wagner

Crossville attorney Harry Sabine scored a  $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$  to edge out all opposition to capture first place in the Cumberland County Championship. The tourney was held in Crossville. Sabine was rewarded for his efforts with a plaque and a \$50 Savings Bond. In the last round Sabine defated Ron Wiley to reign undisputed champion. The event attracted 23 players and as a result a club will be formed.

CHANG WHEENTE CAFERS CHAMPION

The 1972 Wheemie Oafers Tornado was won by Mu Chian Chang, an unrated player, on tiebreaks over Kenneth Spencer. Rick White was third, Mack Garner was top B, Fred Kohn was top C and Joe Rickman took the unrated trophy. The tournament was held at the UT International House. Eighteen players participated.

### TSITSEKLIS SWEEPS APPALACHIAN OPEN

Emanuel Tsitseklis came out of a six month retirement from tournament play to win the Appalachian Open 5-0. Other winners were 2nd, Mack Garner, Class B David Ellis, Class C Ted Lundin, Class D Robert Kyles, and Unrated Mu Chian Chang. State Champion Juan Aristorenas attended, but was relegated to fifth by his draw with White and his loss to Tsitseklis, in the final round. See crosstable on another page in this issue. OUT-OF-STATE TRIO AND NASHVILLE DUO WIN LUCKY TOURNEY

Fifty-one players entered the first USCF tournament sponsored by the Lucky Chess Association. In the Open division, Milan Momic and Charles Irvine, both of Alabama, and Vujadin Popadic of Lexington, Ky., tied for first and \$100 each with scores of 4-1. Out of the 16 players in the Open, five were experts or masters. Meanwhile, Joe Roberdeau and Paul Henry tied for first in the 35 player Amateur with a score of  $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ . M. C. Wright and Jack Swift directed.

The second Lucky Open took place Feb. 17-18 in Nashville. First prize of \$200 was taken by Master Elliot Winslow of St. Louis, winning  $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ , and second prize was won by Milan Momic of Muscle Shoals with 4-1, his prize \$100. A Nashville player, Bruce Stearns of MBA took first in Amateur with a 5-0 score and with it \$100. Second went to Mith Ruth Haring of Ark. with  $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$  and her winning \$50. The Open section attracted 18 players and there were 36 in the Amateur.

## OPENING INMOVATIONS By Robert Ciaffone

After the opening moves of the Sicilian Defence (1 P-M4 P-B4), an increasing popular line of play for white is the gambit 2 P-U4 PXP 3 P-B5. This gambit is known in our country as the Morra Gambit, or sometimes the Smith-Morra Gambit (the Texas Master Ken Smith has done much to popularize the line in the United States). Theoretically, Black can accapt the gambit and obtain at least equality, but by accurate play White gets a persistent initiative well into the middlegame. Players disinclined to arduous defensive play may choose to decline the gambit with 3...P-U4 or 3...N-MB3. The latter move is generally regarded as sounder and will be the subject of this article.

(Editor's note: This article is taken from the publication MICHIGAN CHESS and appeared in the February 1973 issue. From time to time we will present opening articles from other state publications. We would appreciate comments from our readers of this idea. Except for two "improvements" the article is given here as it first appeared in Michigan Chess.)

After the normal moves 4 F-K5 N-44, we reach a position that is frequently attained by transposition via 1 P-K4 F-484 P-484 P-483 N-K3 P-K5 N-44 P-44 P-44 P-45 P-45

White has three options at his fifth move. de may continue in gamoit fashion with 5 B-BH or recapture the pawn by 5 LxF or 5 PxF.

#### Variation A: white plays 5 B-484

In the "old days" this move used to be met by 5...N-N3; the modern method (which seems to yield Black the better game in all variations) is the clever 5...Q-B2! This move was introduced to master play by Rabar in the 1954 Iugoslav Championship in his game against Janosevic. The first point to 5...Q-B2 is that 6 BxN is refuted by 6...\(\frac{1}{2}\)\

The second line of play, which seems even stronger, is 8.....-B3. Since an immediate queen exchange only furthers Black's development, white must move his queen for a third time with 9 Q-KB4, when Black continues 9...r-4 with a strong game (Janosevic-Rabar, 1954 Yugoslav Championship). Guarding the queen with 9 N-42 led to disaster for white in the game rapacostolou - Geller, Varna 1962, which continued 9...QxQ 10 NxQ N-B3 11 N-B3 P-B3 12 PXP PXP 13 B-NB4 P-44 14 N/4-22 P-K4 with an overwhelming position.

An instructive error by Black is the move 8....-B3. This natural-looking developing move does nothing to exploit the exposed position of white's queen. After 9. N-AB3 P-24 10 PxPep qxP 11 N-R3; black is in difficulties (Grant - Ciaffone, 1972 Aichigan Open).

It can be seen that according to current theory white obtains a clearly inferior game if he continues to offer a gambit by 5 d-204. Let us turn our attention to the variations where he recaptures the pawn. (Editor's note: The evaluation of this variation should be modified as it does not consider the better reply 7. B-23 for the bishop retreat but considers only 7. B-3. This "oversight" is not surprising as even Larry avans did not mention it when he evaluated the "Morra Gambit Declined" in Chess Life a neview. After 8-23! Black has two alternatives as follows: (1) 7...F-A3 8 N-33 F-23 9 0-0 B-32 10 BPxP B-B3 with equality and (2) 7...N-B3 8 N-B3 F-A3 9 0-0 F-23 10 BFxP PxP 11 PxP N-22 12 B-BB4 P-233 (d. D. Evans - wilcock, Fostal 1964). In this case White has at least equal chances.)

## Variation B: White plays 5 UxP

This unnatural-looking method of recapturing was chosen by dort against Soviet grandmaster Foligaevsky in the "USSR vs. Rest of the World" match of 1970. The follow-up was 5...P-k3 6 N-B3 N-QB3 7 Q-n4, at which point rolugaevsky played 7...P-Q3, and after several inaccuracies lost the game. Robert Byrne comments after Black's seventh move: "This move may be all right, but we not the aggressive 7...P-B41 after which it is up to white to find a good continuation? For example, 8 Q-K2 makes it difficult for the king bishop to develop (continued next page)

while other queen moves are answered by 8...4-32 with an awkward attack on the king pawn. And, if 8 PxPep (?) NxX3P 9 4-X34 P-44 10 d-4N5 b-43 11 b-884 0-0 12 dxx Pxd 13 0-0 8x8 14 4x8 N-X5 as in Matulovic - Matanovic, Yugoslav Champ. 1958, black has already got a won game."

Another possible line of play at white's 6th move is B-4B4, when 6...P-43 7 rxP M-4B3 8 4-x44 M-B3 9 4-x2 BxP yields black the better game, according to Larry Evans.

Although the 5 exr variation is relatively unexplored, white must improve on present analysis before the variation can be considered reasonable for him.

## Variation C: white plays 5 PxP

After 5 FXF P-23, white has two choices. The first line runs 6 3-484 n-n3 7 8-k5ch 8-22 8 4-k2 5x8 9 4x8ch Q-42 10 N-283 P-k3 11 8-k5 4x4 12 kx4 k-42 13 N-k83 P-44 (rinev - Sajtar, marianske Lazne, 1954). Black has at least an equal game, with a French Defence pawn structure and with the queens and white-squared bishops off the board.

The second line runs 6 N-NB3 N-NB3, where white has three options:
(1) 7 PXP XXP 8 N-B3 B-N5 9 B-N2 P-N3 10 0-0 B-N2 11 Y-N3 0-0 12 NXN FXN 13 B-N3 B-N3 (Unzicker - Geller, 1955). The game is equal. (This is probably white's steadiest continuation.)

- (2) 7 4-N3 F-N3, for which I give two games, both ending in Black victories: 8 B-4N5 B-42 9 N-B3 NXN 10 PXN PXF 11 BXN BXB 12 NXF 4-44 (Minev Najdorf, Amsterdam, 1954) (See also note at end of this sub-variation), and 8 N-B3 NXN 9 FXN FXF 10 NXF NXN 11 PXN B-N2 12 B-N3 0-0 13 N-41 4-B2 14 B-46 BXB 15 PXB 4-B3 16 F-4B4 N-41 17 4-4R3 P-N4 (Padevsky Taimanov, Moscow, 1956). (Editor's note: The game Minev Najdorf continued: 13 P-B37 B-43 14 B-R3 BXN 15 4X4 BX4 16 FXB R-4B1 with a plus for Black. However, White has better with 13 NXB 4XN after which the game is considered even.)
- (3) 7 N-B31? This is white's sharpest line. The superficially attractive 7....xx gives Black very little, since after 8 Pxh he must stop for 8...P-h3 (8...PxP? 9 P-45!) where white can continue 9 FxF BxP 10 B-43 4-h4 11 B-42 with possibly a slight plus.

black's best course is to forfeit castling privileges in return for endgame chances by 7...FXP 8 FXP NXN 9 XXIch AXI 10 FXN, arriving at a critical position. If Black brings his ab outside the pawn chain by 10...d-B4(or 10...B-A5) white must play the sacrifice 11 P-K6, since 11 B-LN5 P-K3 (Presser - Poschel, Central Michigan Open, 1972) leads to a lost game. The point to 11 P-x6 is that 11... BxP can be met by 12 N-N5. So 11...FxF seems best, with unclear complications probably favoring white. The usual tenth move for Black is ...F-KR3 to prevent N-N5. Black can also play an immediate 10...P-h3, since then 11 N-N5 can be met by 11... AXF 12 F-B4 F-AR3. However, 10...F-A3 has no independent significance since the move F-AR3 will have to be played sooner or later anyway. After 10...r-AR3, let us follow the theoretically crucial game Csom - Matulovic (Athens, 1969). 11 B-485 P-x3 12 B-x3 (preventing the Black xB from developing at 4B4, where it proved to be strongly posted in Bisguier - Benko, Atlantic Open, 1967) B-42 13 0-0 A-B2 14 P-4R4 (preventing 14...Nxr) 14...B-K2 (better than 14...P-N4 15 KR-41, when both 15...P-N5 16 N-Q4 NxP? 14 B-MB4 and 15...B-N2 16 B-B5 are bad for Black) 15 kR-Q1 kR-Q1 16 r-R5 8-K1 17 KR-W1! (better than 17 RxR as played in Blohm -Evans, Strawberry Open, 1969) 17...P-W4 (a possible improvement is 17...R-44) 18 P-R3 B-B1 19 F-R4 PxP (if 19...P-N5 20 N-Q4 B-N2 21 P-R6 P-N3 22 R-R4 and 23 R-34) 20 R-R4 P-R6 21 R-QB4 R-Q4 22 N-Q4 P-R3 23 NxW (here Matulovic fell into 23...PxB? 24 d-N6ch K-42 25 N-N8ch etc. After the better 23...BxN 24 BxB PxB 25 R-w6 P-B4, the likely outcome is a draw).

In conclusion, there are few good lines for White after Black declines the Morra Gambit with 3...N-KB3 4 P-K5 N-Q4, and even the best lines give white no more than equality. Players favoring a sound positional game would be well-advised to adopt the move ...N-KB3 against both the Morra Gambit and the 2 P-QB3 attack.

### USCF TD's CERTIFICATION DELAYED By Feter Lahde

The USCF Certification Program for Tournament Directors has been officially delayed for a number of reasons. I have corresponded with both the USCF susiness Lanager and Edmondon and USCF Secretary Martin E. Morrison. dere are their replies:

Ed Edmondson: "The examination has been delayed by the death of Ken darkness and by the publisher's permitting both the dandBOOK and the RULEBOOK to go out of stock. Tell everyone who has been directing tournaments to continue to do so as in the past until those who have applied for certification receive an examination."

Martin E. Morrison: "The Certification Program has run into one snag after another, especially the overloading of the business office of late and the unexpected resignation of Maj. Hudson as Administrative Assistant. The examinations may be circulated in a month or two, although an exact timetable is impossible to construct at this point. In no case, however, will anyone be penalized for business-office difficulties. I expect that certification will not be required until June, perhaps next January. In any case, there will be an initial period of transition, during which certification will be optional."

Frank Skoff (USCF President):"....effective date of the TDCP has been changed from January 1 to July 1, 1973."
