Pete was ever alert for each bit of news from all sections of the state and many times had to write or call someone to jog his memory. If a newsworthy item was not printed, it was because someone forgot to send it to him.

Peter's service as editor was gratis, of course, as is his continuing service as our President. He not only edited the TCN for nearly twenty years, but was the moving force behind the Association during that time. He organized and scheduled the Tennessee Opens, and in recent years the State High School Tournaments, and this year the Tennessee Closed Championship as well. Had he not done this, the TCA would have died years ago.

Most of us have tended to take all this for granted. Perhaps I am one of the few who did not, as I have been privileged to work with him the past several years, helping in the organization of the various TCA tournaments. In doing this, I have learned to appreciate his dedication to chess and his expertise in the handling of TCA affairs.

As one fellow said: "I have not always agreed with Pete." Well, neither have I, but I suppose the best thing is that I can call him a friend. Pete has been a friend to chess and the TCA during all of these years. For all of us, let me say, "Thanks, Pete."

MUTINY ON THE USS CAISSA!

A mutiny of top players is brewing within the US Chess Federation. A number of leading players boycotted the 1977 national championship, and on 20 September the Editor received an "Open Letter to USCF Masters, Policy Board, Journalists," signed by Larry Evans, Arthur Bisguer, Kim Commons, Walter Browne, Ken Smith, Richard Verber, William Lombardy, Jack Collins, and Jude Acers.

This group is forming a Professional Chess Masters Association. Space does not permit reproduction of the letter here, but the gist of the masters' lament is that the USCF is doing little or nothing to promote and protect the economic interests of top-level chess pros. "They're losing money but the administrators are getting raises while the prosstarve."

Specifically, they are calling for CL&R to be edited by masters and for the journal to become a "slick member-grabbing" magazine competing on the newstands for the dollars of some 20,000,000 potential chessplayers in the US. They want the Masters Association to have the power to control and regulate: player selection to international events, minimum guarantees and appearance fees, central booking bureau for lectures and exhibitions, group pension and insurance plans, rules enforcement and playing conditions.

In a flyer accompanying the letter Evans quotes with obvious approval the following statement attributed to Jeffrey Kasner, chairman of the Masters Affairs Committee:

A serious and growing threat to Master chess is the notorious class prize. These prizes, which are basically incentive awards for lower rated players, run contrary to one of the most fundamental goals of the USCF, namely to create a broad base of Masters from which emerge our future titleholders. Instead of motivating U.S. players to improve their ratings, tournaments that offer outrageous class prizes to attract entrants are actually rewarding weakness and encouraging amateurs to stay amateurs.

Let's hear from TCA players and organizers! When space is available, I will publish a sampling of reader reaction to this proposal to reduce (or eliminate?) class prizes.

- <u>CHESS AS AN ART</u> --

One of the problems which plagues chess clubs and tournament organizers throughout the country is the chess drop-out. Each year thousands of new players, young and old, come out, play for a while, and then disappear, their chess sets presumably gathering dust in a storage closet.

Bill McGrath, a teacher in Vermont, offers what the Editor considers a word of sound advice. He warns that the social aspects of the game should be stressed, not winning. Some of his students drop out because they simply can't cope with losses. "Since chess prowess is equated with high intelligence, a defeat is a blow to a player's cherished hopes that he is a cut above the rest of the human race. The athlete can blame nature for not making him strong enough or tall enough; the team player can share the blame with his teammates; the card player can blame a bad deal. Those who stick with chess year after year have learned to love it as an art, as friendly rivalry." [From "Progress Report" by Larry Evans]

FINANCIAL STATEMENT OF TCA TOURNAMENTS

As most of you know, TCA in 1977 expanded its chess activity by holding three regional qualifying tournaments to select the six finalists who played in a closed tournament for the Tennessee Championship. At the annual TCA meeting on 4 September there were mixed reactions. As the Editor interpreted the sense of the meeting, there was general approval of the regional tournament concept, but considerable dissatisfaction with certain aspects, in particular, the prize funds.

In order to promote next year an objective evaluation of the new qualifying tournament system, the Editor is submitting the following data, derived from the TCA financial statement for the period 1 September 1976-31 August 1977:

MORE ON THE MASTERS' MUTINY

As this issue was going to press, a four-page rebuttal to the charges directed against USCF by Larry Evans and others [see story on page 76] was received from Burt Hochberg, Publications Director of CL&R. Once again, space does not permit full reproduction of the contents. The following extracts are from Hochberg's letter of October 10:

Virtually every statement or implication by Evans that purports to be factual is either wrong, misleading, distorted, or quoted out of context....One might well ask what the master is doing for USCF....

At a time when the highest-paid CL&R contributor other than Evans was receiving about \$3,100 for two monthly columns, Evans was receiving \$7800 for his two monthly columns ... When I was given responsibility for CL&R's editorial budget earlier this year... I was forced to bring Evan's fees into fairer alignment with what other writers were getting, although he would remain the highest-paid contributor. His reaction was to attack me via his open letter, which was supposedly issued in behalf of "starving American masters. Where was Evan's concern for "starving American masters" when he was getting over two and a half times more than any other contributor? ...

The fact is that CL&R is now doing more to subsidize the American master than any other function of the USCF. Two years ago, when CL&R pages were substantially reduced, I immediately embarked on a campaign to reduce the number of pages in the Tournament Life section...this year the Postal Chess department was removed from the main body of the magazine...my own "Just for Fun" column...was eliminated, as were "News & Views," the letters column...the "Here & There" department was severely curtailed, and recently "Back to Basics" was terminated. (This last will be revived in a new format, written by masters). All these decisions...were made deliberately to avoid cutting any column written by a master....Evan's charge that CL&R is not helping "starving American masters" is a deliberate falsehood...his attitude reeks of hypocrisy and self-interest.

In this regard it is interesting to look at the "starving...masters" who signed Evan's open letter--strange bedfellows indeed. Evans himself writes two...regular columns in CL&R at higher rates than anyone else's. Walter Browne, whose face appeared on CL&R covers more times than Farrah's on the Enquirer's, and who was the beneficiary of free full-page advertising on his tour, was never refused when he offered articles. William Lombardy had a regular column...(about U.S. masters!) which he chose not to continue when he lost his CL&R job, although the opportunity to continue writing it was offered to him. He was also given free advertising in CL&R for his analytical service. Jack Collins has been offered--by me--two specific columns in CL&R, both of which he refused; he has never offered any idea of his own despite my repeated requests. Arthur Bisguier has often been invited to write for CL&R...Ken Smith, a close friend of Evan's, is the editor and publisher of a chess magazine; since Smith is not a non-profit organization a the USCF is, presumably he does help subsidize "starving American masters." Kim Commons has written several articles for CL&R, and at my invitation recently joined our book review panel. A few months ago he refused an assignment I had offered him! CL&R pays higher rates than any other chess magazine in the entire world, USSR included. I am solely responsible for these offers....

And I should like to remind Larry Evans of what he wrote in <u>Chess Catechism</u> in 1970: "Becoming embittered is one of the greatest hazards facing an aging chess master."

[TCN will do its best to keep its readers informed of both sides of what promises to be a long and bitter, if not mutually suicidal feud.]
