MARTY APPLEBERRY CLINCHES STATE CHAMPIONSHIP

With four wins and two draws in six rounds, Marty Appleberry of Memphis, nailed down the crown as Tennessee's new State Champion. He tied for first place with Kentuckian, Alan Erlebacher, in Tennessee's most prestigious chess event, the Tennessee Open, held in Nashville, September 1-3.

One hundred eleven contestants silently battled at the boards over the long Labor Day weekend in the Ramada Inn on the James Robertson Parkway. With Appleberry and Erlebacher on top of the 37-contestant Open Division as co-champions, Curt Jones of Nashville and M. C. Wright of Hermitage tied for third place with $4\frac{1}{2}$ points each. Locked in a triple-tie for the D prize were Paul Dyer of Knoxville, Ronald Roe Hendersonville, and Johnson Moore of Nashville, with $3\frac{1}{2}$ points each. Roe, rated 1683, also managed to grab the upset prize by laying waste to William Layton of Knoxville, rated 2066.

In the Amateur Division, Alexander Zhislin, a recent emigre' from the USSR, hammered out $5\frac{1}{2}$ points for the championship. Nyuma Shor, another USSR emigre', followed closely with 5 points to anchor himself firmly in the second spot.

William Valentino, Lexington, Ky, tied with Knoxville resident, Thomas Kerlin, for third place, each having four wins and a draw. Bobby Chapuis of Nashville, picked up the Class D prize. Chuck Lovingood, rated 579, an 11-year-old from Crossville, zapped David Barton, rated 1142, of Nashville, to corner the upset prize.

Pedro Yuparibravo, from Lima, Peru, maintained typical Peruvian altitude by pulling out five victories and a draw to lock up the Novice Championship. Close on Yuparibravo's heels came Darryl Marsee (1st below 1000) of Cookeville and Steven Franklin (1st Unrated) of Bowling Green, Ky, with five wins each. Franklin and Marsee were tied for second but chose the named prizes instead as was their option. This left three people tied to divide the second and third place prize money--Rick Cumby of Cookeville, Mike Gee of Cleveland, and Khosnow Naraghian of Memphis, each with $4\frac{1}{2}$ points. Laying claim to the upset prize was Peter Gregory of Nashville, rated 743, who shot down the division's number two man, Mark Gibson of Nashville, rated 1162.

For the first time the concept of teams was instituted in the Novice and Amateur divisions, as well as the usual Scrivener plaque in the Open. Of the six teams in the race for the Scrivener plaque, the Nashville team came out on top with $49\frac{1}{2}$ points. Members of the Nashville team were: Curt Jones ($4\frac{1}{2}$), M. C. Wright ($4\frac{1}{2}$), Jerry Wheeler (4), and Tom Farr (4).

Crossville took the Amateur team prize, spurred on a bit, no doubt, by the fact that no other teams entered this category. The Crossville team members were: Scott Langford ($2\frac{1}{2}$), Keith Lowe ($2\frac{1}{2}$), William Gwin (2), and Chuck Lovingood (2).

TCA MEMBERSHIP DUES

In the Novice Division, Tennessee Tech bounced out three other teams to take first place. The TTU teammates were: Darryl Marsee (5), Rick Cumby (4½), James Burden (4), and Bill Garman (3½).

Bill Garman, incidentally, decided to have a double serving of chess and entered himself in the Novice and Amateur sections simultaneously. As they say -- Once is Not Enough!

Harry Sabine of Crossville directed, assisted by Frank Larimer of Clinton.

MUSIC CITY SUMMER OPEN

Jerry Wheeler scored four wins and drew his last game to Alexander Zhislin to win the Music City Summer Open. Zhislin shared second place honors at 4-1 with Nyuma Shor, David Thistlethwaite, and Milton Wright. Zhislin and Shor are Russian emigrants and for Shor it was his first tourney in the states. In fact, in all there were six Russian emigrants in the event and we may see even more in future events. These four scoring 4-1 divided \$180 of the increased prize fund between them. Thistlethwaite also was highest scorer in Class B and Shor in Class C which added \$70 to the total second place prize fund. Second place in Class B was Brian McCarthy who scored 3½ points. Second in the Class C category was Steven Choatie with three points. Four players tied at 3-2 in the Class D section to divide the \$55 prize fund between them. They were: John W. Moore, Harry Thomas, Bill Conte, and Bruce Burns. In the Class E/UNR section Michael Gee was clear first with three points; he even gave expert Mike Mitelman a scare in the last round. Second was Darryl Marsee with 2½ points.

The tournament was well attended with 46 players. It was held at the Admiral Benbow Inn in Nashville, July 21-22. Peter Lahde directed for the Music City Chess Association.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY FALL OPEN

In what Harry Sabine termed "the largest tournament ever for a one-day event of this type," Crossville garnered in forty players for their September 23rd Cumberland County Fall Open.

In a tie for triumph, Leonard Dickerson of Knoxville, and William Martin of Smyrna, came out with two perfect scores in this four-rounder. Martin, additionally qualified for the top D prize.

In an amazing showing, Chuck Lovingood, a Crossville 11-year-old chess magnate, came in third with three wins and a draw. Chuck, with an antiquated 579 rating, took the prize for top Below 600.

Robert Shearer of Chattanooga tied for the top C prize with Ron Easter of Knoxville. A quadruple tie for top 1000-1199 was shared with Clinton Pearson of Crossville, John White of Crossville, Rick Cumby of Cookeville, and Nancy Weaver of Crossville. Gary Stockslager of Crossville, took the top 601-1000 prize. James Woodward, Hendersonville, Bill Garman, Cookeville, and Scott Langford of Crossville, tied for the top Unrated.

James Burden of Sparta, was the director, running his first tournament very capably.

NEWS FROM USCF

Ratings probably wont be ready before sometime in November. The next supplement is to cover all games through June 15.

Burt Hochberg has resigned as chief editor of Chess Life & Review. The reason for his resignation is that he has received an offer from a publisher to write books. USCF is presently in the process (week of Sept. 17) of screening several promising candidates for the job.

CROSSVILLE: Members of the Cumberland County Chess Club have been active this Fall. August 18, two van loads descended on Cookeville to play in the first one-day Tennessee Tech Warm-up. Labor Day weekend eleven players played in the Tennessee Open. September 15, eight Cumberland countians traveled overnight to the Asheville Tournament. Then, the 22nd of September, Crossville held its biggest ever one-day Open - The Cumberland County Fall Open. Crossville-Sparta now have a traveling trophy (in the hands of Sparta). Scott Langford is writing a weekly column, "The Knight's Corner," for the Crossville Chronicle. Our thanks to our Cumberland County teachers who sponsor our scholastic program.

NEW CHARTER AND BY-LAWS ADOPTED: The proposed new charter and by-laws of the TCA were adopted at the membership meeting held during the Tennessee Open. This cleared the way for filing with the Internal Revenue Service for exemption as an educational non-profit corporation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The application was filed on September 25th and hopefully will be acted upon favorably by the end of the year. Approval of the exempt status by the IRS will insure our non-profit bulk mail privilege and will save us from having to pay sales tax on the publication of the TCN. (Copies of the new charter and by-laws appear in the August-September issue of the TCN.)

NEW OFFICERS ELECTED: With the new bylaws in effect, three new members were added to the Board of Directors of the TCA at the annual business meeting. Leonard Dickerson of Knoxville was elected as the new East Tennessee director, Tom Farr of Hermitage, as the Middle Tennessee Director, and Mahlon Smith of Memphis, as the new West Tennessee representative. President Peter Lahde, Secretary-Treasurer Harry Sabine, and Newsletter Editor John Nichols were all re-elected for additional two-year terms.

NEW TOURNAMENT COORDINATOR: John Hurt of Memphis has been appointed Tennessee's new Tournament Coordinator to fill the unexpired term of Art Hager, who resigned. All clubs in Tennessee who are planning tournaments should send their proposed dates to John well in advance in order to attempt to resolve possible conflicts. One of John's jobs under the new bylaws is to maintain a list of TD's for the state. All clubs need to send John a list of TD's in their area, their address and level of certification.

1980 U. S. OPEN COMES TO THE SOUTH: Atlanta has been chosen as the site for the 1980 U. S. Open by the USCF delegates at their annual meeting. The bid was submitted by Thad Rogers. Atlanta was opposed by some USCF policy board members on the grounds that no Southern city would turn out enough people for a successful tournament. Sounds like it is time for Tennessee to join forces with Georgia and the rest of the South and help prove them wrong next August.

1980 TENNESSEE SCHOLASTICS: Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro, has been selected as the site for the 1980 Tennessee Scholastic Championship. (For complete details on the tournament, see the Tournament Calendar.) Thanks to the help and assistance of David Freitag, president of MTSU's Chess Club and Dr. Leon Stancliff, of the MTSU faculty, MTSU is providing spacious accommodations in the student center at no cost to the TCA for the tournament. The Jackson Motel in Murfreesboro has also agreed to block off 30 rooms for use by participants at very reasonable rates. We would encourage all scholastic chess sponsors, coaches, parents and students to make plans to be in Murfreesboro in January. All sections this year will be five-round, two day events.

EDITOR SERIOUSLY ILL

John Nichols, Editor of the Tennessee Chess News, is seriously ill and is hospitalized in the Johnson City Memorial Hospital. KOLTANOWSKI VISITS NASHVILLE

A touch of merry old England came to Belmont College, Nashville, on Saturday, July 21st, when MIRACLES, Belmont's outdoor summer drama of medieval, cycle plays, hosted the second Medieval Craft's Fair and Festival on that campus. The festival featured chess as part of the day-long entertainment; appropriately so, chess flourished in the Middle Ages. At 10:00 A.M. Mr. George Koltanowski, sponsored by the Church's Fried Chicken Company, performed his famous Knight's Tour for the fairgoers. It was an impressive feat of memory and concentration. He started the tour with his knight on a particular square selected at random by John Storrs and then succeeded in moving the knight around the board covering all 64 spaces without touching any square twice. To Complicate his demonstration even further, Mr. Koltanowski asked the audience to give each square the name of a city. After two minutes of studying the board, Koltanowski turned his back and called out the successive spaces for the knight's progression using the names of the cities.

Following the knight's tour, Mr. Curt Jones invited anyone who wished to challenge him to participate in a simultaneous chess exhibition. There were ten players who accepted the challenge. For the next two hours, Curt dispatched his challengers one by one. His record: nine wins and one draw (The draw was achieved by John White of Crossville). Each challenger, however, was a winner. The Church's company provided each entrant with a "Be My Guest" coupon for a dinner compliments of this company which continues to make contributions to chess.

SERIWAN WINS WORLD JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Yasser Seirawan is the new World Junior Champion. The young Seattle master scored 10-3 against top juniors from around the world to win the Championship tournament held in Skein, Norway from July 27 to August 10. He was tied with Alexander Chernin of the Soviet Union after nine rounds, but finished strongly to win the title outright. Chernin finished with 9½. Seirawan was assisted by his second, John Donaldson of Seattle, Washington. A second helps with pre-game preparations, analysis of adjourned positions and in keeping tabs on the opposition.

Seirawan adds the World Junior Championship to laurels already gathered during an outstanding year. At the 1979 Lone Pine Tournament he scored 5½-3½, a spectacular result considering his opposition. He faced eight Grandmasters in nine rounds, including the quartet that ultimately tied for first. Seirawan won the right to represent the United States at the World Junior by winning the US Junior Championship recently held in Los Angeles. He automatically becomes an International Master by virtue of his victory in Norway. His results prior to Skein would have led FIDE to award the title, in any case, at the Congress currently being held in Puerto Rico.

Further details and games from the World Junior will follow as soon as they are available.

Grandmaster Florin Gheorghiu of Romania took clear first at the 1979 US Open Championship. He scored 10½ points in twelve rounds and finished ½ point ahead of American Grandmaster Arthur Bisguier, who finished clear second. Seven players tied for 3rd--9th: Peter Biyiasas, Lev Alburt, Mark Diesen, Andrew Soltis, Vincent McCambridge, Jay Whitehead, and Zoran Gajic. About 550 players competed in the event, which was held at Chicago's Palmer House from July 29 to August 10. The tournament was directed by Michael Zacate and Richard Verber.

Gheorghiu has now moved into first place in the Church's Grand Prix. He has amassed 58.29 points by winning the 1979 US Open, the Philadelphia International, and sharing in a seven way tie for top honors at the 1979 World Open. Grandmaster Walter Browne is second; he won the 1979 CalChess Masters Open and shared first at the World Open for a total of 40.29 points. Grandmaster Arthur Bisguier, now in third with 38.39, has moved up quickly by sharing first place at the World Open and coming clear second at the US Open. In contrast, Vitaly Zaltsman, now in fourth, has collected his 33.96 points in nine events. Zaltsman is followed by young Vincent McCambridge who has 26.54. The next ten places are: Jay Whitehead (25.79), Vectors Pupols (25.50), Boris Baczyński (24.33), Mark Ginsburg (22.17), Mark Diesen (21.29), John Fedorowicz (18.79), Paul Whitehead (18.00), Larry Christiansen (18.00), Nick deFirmian (18.00), and Walter Morris (18.00).

The French Defense

This is one of the oldest, soundest and most popular defenses to 1 e4. After 1 ..e6 2 d4 d5 black is already seeking the initiative by attacking e4.

The exchange 3 ed5 is drawish and recommended for those afraid of the French Defense. A good line for black to try to avoid drawish lines is 3 ...ed5 4 Bd3 Nc6 5 Nf3 Bd6 6 0-0 Bg4 7 c3 Nge7 8 Re1 Qd7 9 Nbd2 0-0-0 10 b4 Rde8 11 Nb3 f6 12 Nc5 Bc5 13 bc5 Nd8 etc.

The advance variation with 3 e5 has little sting and black obtains an easy game. For example: 3 ...c5 4 c3 Nc6 5 Nf3 Qb6 6 Be2 cd4 7 cd4 Nh6 8 b3 Nf5 9 Bb2 Bb4+ 10 Kf1 etc.

The classical variation 3 Nc3 has been extensively played and analysed for a century. It continues 3 ..Nf6 4 Bg5 Be7 5 e5 Nfd7

The most popular today is the Winawer with 3 ..Bb4 4 e5 c5 5 a3 Bc3+ 6 bc3 Ne7 at which point white has several choices: 7 Qg4 or 7 Nf3 or 7 a4 or 7 h4. All of these lead to exciting games with winning chances for both sides. For example:

To avoid the Winawer white resorts to 3 Nd2 (Tarrash's System). Black's best choice is to rapidly develop usually with 3 ...c5 as in Karpov-Korchnoi 1974 4th Match Game 4 ed5 5 Ngf3 Nbc6 6 Bb5 Bd6 7 dc5 Bc5 8 0-0 Ne7 9 Nb3 Bd6 10 c3 Bg4 11 Nbd4 0-0 12 Be2 Re8 Drawn in 45 moves.

Some are bothered by the backward development of black's queen bishop in the regular lines, but as in the queen's gambit declined, it always gets into play with proper play. And quite often black ends up with the better endgame!

KNOW THE TOURNAMENT RULES!

By David Thistlethwaite

Situation: In a tournament game between player X and player Y the flag of player X's clock falls before the completion of the time control period. Player Y, seeing that his scoresheet is incomplete, makes no mention of the flag fall and proceeds to fill in the moves. After completing his scoresheet, player Y summons the director and claims a win on time. Player X challenges this claim on the grounds that moves were filled in after the flag fell, an act prohibited by USCF tournament rule 17.1.

Ruling: Player Y is declared the winner of the game because a flag is not considered fallen until one of the players claims it so. Player X should have brought the fallen flag and incomplete scoresheet to the attention of the tournament director in order to protect himself against all claims in that time control period. In this case, the moves recorded after the flag fall but before the claim are considered properly recorded moves.
