CURT JONES OF NASHVILLE 1978 TENNESSEE STATE CHAMPION (JUL 22-23)

Curt Jones of Nashville agreed to a draw with Gary Newsom of Newbern in the final round of the 2nd Tennessee Closed Championship to emerge with a clear 1st with 4-1 points to win the title and trophy. As he had handily won the High School Championship earlier this year, Curt was favored to win the Junior Champion title as well at the 33rd Tennessee Open, but the triple crown was denied him by a tie-break loss against Gregory Hood of Memphis.

Second place in the 6-man round-robin went to David Pendergast (3-2), who recently moved from New York to the small town of Sharps Chapel, near Knoxville. Another Knoxville player, Leonard Dickerson, the lowest rated player, took 3rd place. He started with two losses, but rallied to win two in a row and then fight Henry Robinson of Clarksville to a draw in the final round. A very fine performance!

Emanuel Tsitseklis of Knoxville, who won the state title in 1976 at the TN Open and again last year in the 1st Closed Championship, was disqualified by being defeated by Pendergast at the East Tennessee Regional. Mack Garner of Knoxville, who did qualify this year and who proposed this system of determining the state champion, did not play, as the event conflicted with the Pfefferkorn Open in NC.

All players took home a share of the prize fund and were given \$25 expense money to attend the tournament. Out-of-towners had free lodging at the motel.
