#### Postal Chess In Review by Jack Smith, Postal Master

I am repeatedly asked three questions about postal chess.

(1) How long does it take to play a game? Usually about one year.

(2) What is an "if" move? An example is: 1.e4 if e5 then 2.Nf3. These if moves save time and postage. I have sent as much as 5 moves in ifs, but that can be a good way to have your games end more quickly, but less favorably. The longer the analysis, the more room for error. (3) How do you play Postal Chess? You pays your money and you takes your chances. Seriously, you simply send your entry fees and after receiving your pairings send your first moves as white to the opponents indicated and answer the cards you get in the mail. Some great master once said that postal chess was just like an over the board (OTB) game that was

USCF's Championship is called the Golden Knights and has a larger entry and prize fund than the others. USCF also publishes a \$10 yearly bulletin concerned only with postal chess.

adjourned after each move. It is,

CCLA celebrates its 75th year of existence in 1984. It features very good sevice to the players, as you might expect, and only has postal games, (and some international news), in The Chess Correspondent. The level of competition is said to be higher than in USCF. It is the Grandaddy of them all and is run by members.

APCT is the only profit-making venture listed. The Warrens of Illinois run this organization, and run it very well by all indications. Helen Warren is the former editor of Illinois Chess Bulletin and APCT's Bulletin reflects her skills. They also feature very good service to players, as they are players themselves and they are running a business. Helen is well known across the country for her work for USCF on committees and her bid for a Policy Board seat.

USPCF is the umbrella organization for the organizations already mentioned and the Armed Forces postal organization. It is the liason to ICCF for the United States and itself holds the biannual US Correspondence chess Championship, for which you must gualify by rating. Their tournament is considered the US championship.

ICCF is the International organization for postal chess. They use numeric notation. I don't recommend ICCF for newcomers below Expert or Cat I A Class USCF OTB. The rules are complicated and precisely followed. The postage is more expensive and the games take longer. It is the way to the World Championship however. Fernschach is published in German.

Lastly, TCA offers a local Tournament Director. Kent Meadows, and mostly local opponents. All the EFs are returned as prizes and it is an extremely good way to gain experience in postal chess before venturing out to the other organizations mentioned. In fact, of my 3 losses and 4 draws (so far), 2 losses and 3 draws were TCA games.

Some other concerns:

Notation, ICCF is numberic (al algebraic is QR1 English Descriptive is 11 numeric). The others allow for agreement between opponents on the notation used. USCF default notation is algebraic, I believe the others' defaults are English Descriptive. (They'll come around.)

Time Control, there are two primary time controls in use. The older is 3 days, not counting postal holidays, per move. (If you get a card on 1 3 84 it would be due to be in the mail on 1 6 84.) The newer is 10 moves in 30 days, not counting holidays. With this one you can move quickly in the opening and spend more time on the critical positions.

Ratings, USCF master is 1700, CCLA and APCT masters are 1200. ICCF is just coming out with their own system. Your OTB rating will be used to compute your first postal rating.

**Blunders**, there are no blunders in postal chess, there are only "clerical errors." Actually, there are fewer outright blunders, there is more time to analyze.

It is claimed that most players begin to play postally in order to learn openings. Usually they learn a great deal more about middlegames, analysis, and strategy. In games with fewer tactical errors the strategic backbone of a game is much more easily seen and appreciated. This is not to say that there aren't tactics however. Make a mistake and watch the fireworks. A postal combo is a wonder in itself. One does need opening references for postal play. Yes, it is legal to use books, opening, middlegame or endgame. It is **not** legal to use "move generating devices" such as other people or machines. For more specific information write: USCF 186 route 9W, New Windsor, NY 12550

I think it is a shame that so few chessplayers avail themselves of this method of enjoying the royal game. It is a great way to learn. Many OTB masters earned their spurs through the mail. And, all in all, it is a very inexpensive way to play very good chess.

Consider entering a TCA section to get your feet wet. As Kent has said, "Nothing beats getting a tear-stained card with RFSIGNS on it."

#### **BOOK REVIEW**

Spanish (Ruy Lopez): Chigorin

by Anatoly Bikhovsky Published November 1983; 114 pages of text, index of variations. Batsford paperback, \$14.95. Figurine algebraic. Review by Jack Smith

Bikhovsky is a Soviet International Master and the Chief Junior Trainer for the Russians. As such his book though primarily an opening reference, contains a great many strategic pointers and "lessons" in how to play the main line of the Ruy. This sequence has probably been seen in more master games than any other (1.e4 e5 2.Nf3 Nc6 3.Bb5 a6 4.Ba4 Nf6 5.0-0 Be7 6.Rel b5 7.Bb3 d6 8.c3 0-0 9.h3 Na5 10.Bc2 c5 11.d4) since Duras-Chigorin, 1906. Fischer refers to playing the Ruy as "milking the cow": this opening is the stock-in-trade of Grandmasters. Its strategic nature lends itself to their superior understanding and the tactical niceties are sufficiently deep to baffle the superficial.

The book mentions as references both ECO and The Closed Ruy Lopez by Wade, et al. published in 1970, among others, and has game references up until January 1, 1982. Thus Bikhovsky has used two of the primary resources available to US players and updated them. Grab the last couple of Informants and you're theoretically prepared to do battle.

This book could be very valuable to a young player of promise. Since the analvsis of the first few moves of the Ruy is available in nearly every beginner's book. as well as in inumerable annotated games in periodicals and game collections, the fact that this book virtually begins at move 11 is an advantage. No book could examine the Ruy in 114 pages completely. but Bikhovsky has limited himself to one, albeit the major, line, and has done a most creditable job. The other advantage is that the "lessons" and hints given in the text border on middle-game considerations, rather than just the tactical no-no's usually the meat of an opening book's analysis. Thus one can grasp this

opening in light of the middlegames to a much greater degree than is usually possible. Since the Ruy has long been the playground on which the super-masters have cut their strategic teeth, studying the Ruy with this IM at your shoulder cannot but help you to develop a greater sense of strategy.

For example, after the above sequence, 11...Qe7 12.Nbd2 Ne6 13.d5 Nd8, the continuation 14.a4 is discussed as follows: "This is how Karpov likes to play. It's a more flexible continuation than 14.Nfl. White doesn't try to win through a direct attack on the king, but conducts play on both flanks. Accordingly, he doesn't commit his knight on d2 for the time being. Black's pawn on b5, of course, is now under attack, and defending it entails positional concessions. It's remarkable how opinions change; not so long ago. the advanced pawn on b5 was looked upon as Black's pride and joy-as the basic prerequisite for his Queen's side counterplay. But with the modern way of treating the Spanish Game, this pawn more often turns out to be a weakness."

The book would have been better with more of these comments. This does credit to the translation, by John Sugden, and the author.

Even in the absence of comments, the alternatives themselves are a source of education. This is the nature of the Ruy. So buy an opening book and let a little strategical education seep in.

The first five chapters follow 11...Qc7 12.Nbd2 where the central position has been clarified. The next two chapters follow the same sequence when the center is still fluid. The last section, chapters 8-10, discuss lines avoiding the "standard position."

I find myself losing perspective where the price of new chess books is concerned. Everything costs more these days, and Batsford produces well made books, usually with few errors, by fine authors. Their opening books are more than just recapitulations of other opinions and older books as is too often the case with less expensive monographs.

#### Book Review by Jack Smith Correspondence Chess by Hanon W. Russell

Published June 1980; 187 pages; paper-back, \$9.50; indices of openings and players; algebraic notation.

Having recently become a USCF Postal Master, I decided to do some research on postal chess. Accordingly, I bought this book, unseen, from the USCF catalog. I've had bad results buying "blind," but not this time.

The book traces the history of correspondence chess from before the 19th century to 1980, and includes the ICCF World Championships I-VIII (which, by the way, crowns a new World Champion every three years just like OTB chess does).

One of the book's most interesting aspects is its references to OTB Grandmasters who have played postal chess. Games by Keres. Ragozin. Alekhine. Euwe and Nimzovich are included, and the Steinitz-Chigorin epic postal war is presented in a separate chapter with Steinitz's own wonderful notes. The reader is invited to draw is own conclusions about the relative strength of these eminent players. Note that OTB Grandmasters do not always win; however, Fischer would seem to be Fisher, either OTB or on a card . . . .

Correspondence Chess contains many games, most with collected annotations, as well as numerous diagrams, and is great material for both study and amusement. Hanon Russell is respected as the translator of such books as Tal-Botvinnik 1960 and Karpov's My Best Games, and has written a column for the Chess Correspondent. His own postal experience vields much valuable advice about the "how to" of postal chess. Alekhine pointed out that over-the-board play and postal play "complement each other," vet little is usually said for postal chess. I am especially pleased that Correspondence Chess speaks so well of its subject.


For this issue's ideas lets talk about the mating attack, or "Building a Box" as I like to call it

There has been much written about patterns and about how the best chess players seem able to recognize very subtle patterns in very complicated positions. Lets take the hint, and apply this idea to mating attacks.

In the basic mate of Rook and King against King, the Rook, because it attacks along the ranks and files, automatically makes a box around the opposing King.

The only way out for the King is to take the Rook which is why the Rook must be supported by his own King.

The problem for the attacking side is that the box is always too big, and must be built smaller to hold the other King in mate. To do this, we push the opposing King into a corner where the edge of the board provides two sides of the box.




In the diagram above, Black mates easily with a waiting move such as 1... Rc3 and 2. Kal (forced) Rc1 mates.


Idea: Kings are always most easily mated when they stand in a corner because only four squares must be denied the King.

Notice the role that the Black King plays in building the box by attacking the squares along the second rank. The same result would be achieved with Black Pawns on a3 and b3, again building the box along the second rank. And the same thing again results with Black Knights on a4 and b4: the pattern is the same!


Often, the defending side's own pieces and pawns are a part of the box.




Here is another pattern that occures frequently:



With Black to move, he mates in two with 1.....Qd3+ and which ever way the King moves, cl or el, the Bishop mates on a6 or g6.

Idea: After corners, Kings are most easily mated when they stand at the edge of the board where now six squares must be denied him.




Amazingly, even with the connected passed pawns on the seventh rank, white loses without the move.

Example: 1. d2+. 2. Kd1 Bg4 mate!

Recognize the pattern?

If the King were to move 2, Kb1, then queening the d pawn mates, (a tough problem-what is the result if White does have the move?

One last position:



With Black to move, the mate is neat with 1....Qe3+ and 2. Ror Qe2 Rc1 mate, not unlike the box in the first two diagrams: or Kd1 Rc1 mate, and a box muck like the last two is closed.

Next issue, we will look at game situations where these boxes are built with winning results.
