A Tribute to Louis Groeniger

Look to this day!

For it is life, the very life of life.
In its brief course
Lie all the verities & realities of your existence:
The bliss of growth
The glory of action
The splendor of beauty.
For yesterday is but a dream
And tomorrow is only a vision,
But today well lived makes yesterday
a dream of happiness
And every tomorrow a vision of hope,
Look well, therefore, to this day!

In 1978 I was playing in my third USCF-rated tournament. While walking about to check out my competition, I was attracted to the board of an elderly, white-haired man who impressed me with his determination and calm. Of course he was the oldest participant at the tournament. But it was his demeanor that made him outstanding. While others labored over their games and visibly strained to conjure up combinations, this fellow looked at the board with dignified composure. I figured that the game must be a blowout -- for him or his opponent -- else he would not seem so nonchalant. However, looking at the position on the board, I was surprised to see such a complex array of pieces that only luck or a master tactician could navigate through. As I watched him make his moves so intrepidly, I figured that surely he was at least an expert. But why wasn't he positioned on the upper boards? Had he been upset by a lower-ranked opponent?

I went to the wall charts to verify his rating strength: Lou Groeniger, rating 1530. Really? I went back to the board to verify colors. Yes, it was Lou — displaying his usual expert tactical prowess. He could play at the highest levels, and, indeed, had many an expert on the ropes. However, because

he felt that chess was a fun expression secondary to life and happiness, he sometimes did not display the "killer" intensity. He said that chess was a nice activity, but his true gratification came from life and giving. And, indeed, his life exemplified, this statement.

Lou, born in Cincinnati, Ohio on November 7, 1911, began working at Oak Ridge in 1946 as an employee of the National Labor Relations Board and joined the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) Oak Ridge Operations in May 1947 as chief of the industrial personnel branch. After a distinguished career and many promotions, he retired from the AEC in 1973 with 31 years of service. Among the many rewards that he received during his career was an Outstanding Citizen Award from the NAACP. He participated in productions of the Oak Ridge Community Playhouse, served as president of the Oak Ridge High School Service Club, chaired the Oak Ridge High School Band Ways and Means Committee, helped organize the Youth Service Committee, and with the help of his wife of 62 years, Esther, helped organized the Mental Health Committee. Besides being active in correspondence chess play, he coached the Rocky Hill Elementary Chess Club before scholastic chess was fashionable. In fact, during 1984 he had to go to Crossville to match up his players because there were no other local schools active at chess!

I remember the many trips that we made to Crossville to play in Harry Sabine's one-day competitions. I always looked forward to the drive because Lou would share his experience with me and give me needed advice in every area of my life. He was the grandfather that I never knew.

The Knoxville Chess Club began missing Lou in 1990 when he slacked his OTB chess activities. And in October 1992 he and his wife moved to Omaha to be close to Elli, his daughter, and Liz, his granddaughter. Eight months after moving there he

was diagnosed as having cancer. Chemo-therapy hastened his demise, and he passed Jan. 3, 1994. Remarkably, he was still actively engaged in correspondence chess in December!

Seeing Lou dispatch his opponents in a blaze of tactics that seemed to appear from nowhere and rescue him from what the casual eye might perceive as a loss, alerted one to the fact that if Lou had the desire he could defeat practically anyone. His concentration did fade in tournaments over three rounds. But other factors may have been at work, too. In one particular case I asked him why he hadn't executed some sharp tactics that were obviously at his command and continued slaughtering his young opponent. He said that the youngster was looking so miserable that he found it tough to be "mean," so he made good moves while not seeking the best move with the same drive that characterized his earlier play. Well, Lou did not always play the "good" guy. A glance at an anthology of his games will convince anyone that he had the killer instinct to maintain a grip and execute his opponents.

This is one of the paradoxes of Lou's play. Elder players are suppose to be positionally minded, deliberate plodders with a zeal for known book endings. But Lou's games are filled with energy, creativity, and sharpness. In the last ten years of his tournament play he never played a dull game. He favored gambits, and, indeed, was widely known for his daring in the Latvian. But this was not the only gambit that he ventured. He dared to play the Grob Attack (or Spike, 1. g4). He was ever eager to get his opponent out of book-lines by playing a lesser-known variation where he could gambit material for the initiative. He simply loved possessing the initiative! He gambled at almost every opportunity to seize the initiative, figuring in many cases that it was worth a whole rook! (See Igou vs. Groeniger or Carpenter vs. Groeniger.) He was especially dangerous with the Black pieces. Over 60% of his career wins came from the Black pieces.

Trying to select from his many wins was a joy. (See the Annotated Games column on page 9.) I expected to see characteristic B-Class mistakes throughout his games. But I was elated to find inspiring and instructional games embodying sparkling tactics. All the games were vital and alive. In fact, they could well be the foundation to teach a player how to pursue and maintain the initiative! His wins are a gambit player's delight. And even the games that he lost are valuable, since most of his losses were caused by him making an obvious blunder of inattention rather than being outmaneuvered and beat by his opponent. Though his rating fluctuated about the 1600 range, his games show that he regularly played tactics on the expert level, while his correspondence play yielded tactics of such depth that only a first-class master could negotiate the maze.

His demeanor, respect for others, and giving spirit reaped him respect from all. Even in defeat his opponents were forced to graciously resign. Consider his game with Carpenter! I've never seen Richard smile after losing a game--not to mention taking such a planking! But Lou, a gentleman in life and at the chess board, could bring out the best in everyone.

He was the best of friends, and I have been inspired by him. His respect and belief in equality is known by any who were lucky enough to receive his personalized cards with the



picture of the loving black and white babies. The above poem by Kalidasa was his favorite, voicing his theme: live today well. And he daily practiced his second favorite poem, giving kindness at every opportunity: Peace on Earth.

Annotated Games: Enjoying the Play of Lou Groeniger

(by Leonard Dickerson)

Lou conducted all of his postal chess games with daring. Here is another of his spectacular efforts with the Grob (or Spike). I thought that his opponent was doing well out of the opening, but the complications will make any assessment difficult.

L. Groeniger - John Ishkanian PT-8 PPCL (15 Dec 80 - 23 Jul 81)

1.g4 d5 2.Bg2 e5 3.c4 c6 4.d3 dc4 5.Nc3 Bg4 6.h3 Bh5 7.Be4 cd3 8.Bd3 Bc5 9.Ne4 Bb6 10.Qb3 f5 11.Ng3 Bf7 12.Qc2 e4 13.Bc4 Bf2 14.Kf2 Qd4 15.Be3 Qc4 16.Qc4 Bc4 17.Nf5 Bf7 18.Nd6 Kf8 [diagram]



19.Ne4 Na6 (Well, a superficial glance says that 19... Bd5 looks good, but 20. Bc5+ K-moves and 21.N+ ensures that White keeps the initiative. With all the complications, I just trust that their weeks of analysis presents us with the best moves!) 20.Nf3 Bd5 21.Nd6 Bf3 22.ef3 Nb4 23.Nb7 Nd3 24.Kg3 Nb2 25.Bc5 Kf7 26.Rab1 Nd3 27.Nd6 Kg6 28.Bd4

Rd8 29.Rb7 (Lou knew how to keep the pressure up. Once the initiative was his, he never let up.) 29...Rd6 30.Bg7 Ne7 31.Bh8 Nf5 32.Kh2 Nf2 33.Rg1 Kh5 34.Ra7 Nh4 35.Rh7 Rh6 36.Rh6 Kh6 37.Kg3 A neat finish to a sparkling game! 1-0.

The second game shows that even if Lou starts with an unassuming line his opponent should be wary. At the first opportunity Lou injects such life and force into the game that his opponent swiftly collapses.


Jos. Musiajek (1985) - Black: L. Groeniger APCT SC-12 (1985)

1.d4 Nf6 2.Nc3 e6 3.e4 Bb4 4.Bd3 Nc6 5.Ne2 O-O 6.O-O h6 7.Bf4 d6 8.a3 Ba5 9.b4 Bb6 10.d5 ed5 11.ed5 Ne7 12.Ng3 Re8 13.Bc4 Ng6 14.Bc1 (After this miserable retreat, White's queenside pieces become ineffective. With the initiative in hand, Lou begins the domination.) 14...Ne5 15.Bb5 Bd7 16.Ba4 Bg4 17.Nce2 c6 18.h3 Bh5 19.Kh1 Nfg4 (Lou suddenly remembers where White's king is! When attacked by the h-pawn, Lou rarely retreated his Knight. This attack theme is obvious and can be seen in two more of the games showcased here. He was always looking for the opportunity to liven things up.) 20.Ne4 Qh4 21.f4 Nc4 22.Nd6 (Facing multiple threats, White falls apart.) 22...Nd6 0-1.

The third game shows Lou conducted the over-the-board attack with the same zeal as his correspondence games. Lou rarely showed any fear of his opponent's rating.

1.e4 e5 2.Nf3 f5 3.Bc4 fe4 4.Ne5 (Lou faced this position of the Latvian every year since 1980. This opening characterized him best - enterprising and daring! He was known for his ability to defend this position.) [diagram]



4...Nf6 (See Velasquez vs. Groeniger to determine if the Queen check at h5 is so terrible.)
5.Nf7 Qe7 6.Nh8 d5 7.Be2 Bf5 (Played to defend against 8.Bh5+ or even 8. Ng6, ruining the Black kingside pawn structure.) 8.g4 Be6 9.g5 Ng8 10.d4 g6 11.Bf4 Bg7 12.Be5 Nc6 13.Bg7 (13. Bb5 is a little better.) 13...Qg7 14.Bb5

Ne7 15.Ng6 hg6 16.Qe2 (A mistake following the previous lazy 14th move. White is being lulled to sleep by his riches, figuring that anything wins and that he doesn't have to think.) 16...Qd4 (Now Black has the initiative.) 17.Nc3 O-O-O 18.Bc6 Nc6 19.Rd1 Qe5 20.Qd2 d4 (Lou hurries to punish Carpenter for loitering in the center!) 21.Ne2 e3 (Another energetic blow!) 22.fe3 de3 23.Qc3 (White blunders while trying to relieve Black's pressure and hopefully enter a tolerable endgame. 23. Qc1 would have allowed White to hang on for more punishment, such as 23. ... Rxd1 followed by Nb4 or Qxb2.) 23...Rd1 24.Kd1 Qd5 0-1. I've often seen Richard get upset when he loses. He glares at the board, scowls, and dashes for the door, only some times allowing his opponent a perfunctory handshake. However, he smiled broadly after the

loss and shook Lou's hand firmly. Lou brought out the best in people.

Jose Velasquez (1727) - L. Groeniger Knoxville Club Swiss, 1987

1.e4 e5 2.Nf3 f5 3.Bc4 fe4 4.Ne5 d5 5.Qh5 g6 6.Ng6 hg6 7.Qg6 (7.Qxh8 Be6 and Black uses his lead in development to pressure White. So rather than settle for a "comfortable" plus, White goes for more, envisioning a mating net or win of the Black Queen.) 7...Ke7 8.d4 Bh6 (Excellent! Defending the threat of Bg5 and maintaining the initiative.) 9.Bh6 Rh6 10.Qg7 Kd6 (The Steinitzian King!) 11.Qe5 Kc6 12.Bb3 Re6 13.Qg3 Na6 14.Nc3 Ne7 15.O-O-O [diagram]



15...b5 (Both bold and necessary to complete development! Lou was never afraid to take chances - he knew how to play gambits!)
16.Qg5 (Perhaps f3 is better.)
16...Nb4 (Excellent! If 16...Rd6 to add defense to the d-pawn, then Rhe1 with thoughts of Rxe4 with an x-ray attack on the b5 weakness.) 17.a3 Rg6 (This is very necessary! If Lou retreats his

Knight, then the d-pawn and the Rook at a8 drop to Bxd5+.) 18.Qh5 Bg4 (The fault with White trying to maintain his pressure on the d-pawn bears fruit for Lou.) 19.Qh4 Bd1 20.Rd1 Na6 21.g4 Kb6 22.Qh5 c6 (White can now honorably resign. Lou's daring and enterprise have taken another victim in spectacular style. It often happened that when Lou offered his gambit, the "stronger" players would seek to out-combine. Offering the gambit is also an attitude of play.) 23.Qh3 Qd6 24.Kb1 Rag8 25.Ne4 de4 26.Bg8 Rg8 27.Qh5 Qd5 28.Qh7 Ng6 29.h4 Nf4 30.g5 Nh3 31.g6 Nf2 32.Rf1 e3 33.Re1 Ng4 34.h5 Nf6 35.Qf7 Qd4 36.h6 e2 37.Kc1 Qf4 38.Kb1 Qf1 39.Rf1 ef1Q

18.ef7 (Lou's enterprising play always shows more value for the initiative than material.) 18...Kf7 19.Ne5 Be5 20.Qe5 Re8 21.Qf4 1-0.

Lou could also play normal chess moves! Consider here his victory over Igou, a near-expert player. Too, note the presence of Lou's characteristic energy and ability to seize and maintain the initiative.

Rick Igou - L. Groeniger Cleveland, TN Match, 1985

1.d4 Nf6 2.Nd2 d5 3.e3 Bf5 4.Ngf3 (4. c4 followed by Qb3 is the standard way to punish Black's early Bishop escape. Rick stubbornly sticks to his opening, though, refusing to let Lou lure him in to a tactical meelee.) 4...Nc6 5.Bd3 Bg6 6.a3 Qd6 7.O-O O-O-O (Typical Lou - ever going for the full point, showing little fear of his opponent.) 8.Qe2 h5 9.b4 h4 10.Bg6 fg6 11.Ng5 [see diagram next page]



11...Ne5!? (Defending against a big threat with surprises! Lou reacts violently to White's threatened family fork. One never got the chance to grind Lou down. You either beat him quickly or not at all.) 12.f4 Neg4 13.c4 (White goes for more, trying for the whole board since he knows that the fork will still be around.) 13...dc4 14.Nc4 (This

lets Lou off the hook. In many of his games his enterprising play incites his opponents to recklessness - playing into his forte!) 14...Qd5 15.Bd2 Rh5 16.Rac1 e6 17.b5 b6 18.a4 h3 19.g3 Be7 20.Nf7 Rf8 21.Nfe5 Ne5 22.Ne5 Rfh8 23.Ng6 [diagram]




(White trys to out-combine Loubut overlooks the depth of Lou's concept. Lou's keen eye reminds one of Reshevsky's eternal youthfullness!) 23...Qg2 24.Qg2 hg2 25.Ne7 Kd7 26.Kg2 Rh2 27.Kf3 Rd2 28.Ng6 Re8 29.Ne5 Kc8 30.Rc4 Nd7 31.Nf7 Re7 32.Ng5 Rd3 33.Rg1 Nf8 34.Ke4 Ra3 35.Nf3 Nh7 36.Ne5 Nf6 37.Kf3 Nd5 38.Re1 Re8 39.Nf7 Rf8 40.Ng5 Kd7 41.Ne4 g6 42.g4

Rf4. 0-1. Finally the maneuvering ends with this nice tactical shot! This is one of Lou's better efforts. He could generally obtain a won game against anyone but tired later or simply lost interest. This quality game shows that he could play on a higher level if he chose.

Lou could also play the White pieces! His games with Black were generally more dynamic, though - just like my play! Still, this games shows that Lou does not need to offer gambits to play spritely.

L. Groeniger (1468) - Mickey Bowman (1710) Tri-City Fall Open, 1986

1.d4 Nf6 2.Nf3 g6 3.g3 b6 4.Bg2 Bb7 5.O-O Bg7 6.c4 O-O 7.Nc3 d6 8.Bf4 (Provocative. This move invites e5 with a gain of tempo. But Black seems to be a mite disoriented and plays differently.) 8...c5 9.d5 Nbd7 10.e4 Ng4 (...Nh5 seemed more natural, but Black tries for control of e5, simultaneously gaining a tempo on the c-pawn while presenting White problems with the a1-h8 diagonal. He does not want to simply chase the White Bishop to the better d2-square.) 11.Qd2 Nge5 12.Bh6 (Here we go again. Of course 12. Nxc4 is strong for Black. But this is another case of a higher-rated opponent trying to punish Lou brilliantly - and coming up short!) 12...Nf3 13.Bf3 Ne5 14.Be2 (I'll bet Black didn't see this!) 14...Bc8 15.Bg7 Kg7 16.Kg2 f5 17.f4 Nf7 18.Bf3 (Excellent) Centralizing and clearing the e-file for a rook. Correspondence play taught Lou piece coordination. His forcing play will bring quick concessions.) 18...Bd7 19.Rae1 e5 (The threat of e5 prompts Black to play actively, regardless of the subsequent backward d-pawn.) 20.de6 Be6 21.b3 Qd7 (Lou's steady pressure bears

fruit. 21... Rb8 was better. Black is probably still chiding himself for not snatching the c-pawn on the 12th move! He sees a 4-move combo but fails to give Lou his dues. Lower-ranked players must give their respect! Watch out for Lou!) 22.ef5 Bf5 [diagram] 23.Ba8 Bh3 24.Kg1 Bf1 25.Rf1 (This exchange is much stronger than the prosaic retreat of the bishop to d5. Black has been out-combined!) 25...Ra8 26.Nd5

Nh6 (Facing mounting pressure and beset by doubt, Black makes a weak move that hastens his imminent demise.) 27.Qc3 Kf7 28.Qf6 1-0.

The final game is so complex that I will not analyze it heavily. There are just too many complicated if-moves! Sharp games with tremendous activity characterized Lou's play with the Black pieces even in OTB play. Just enjoy!

Bob Diebold -J., Groeniger Cr. 1980

1.e4 e5 2.f4 ef4 3.Nf3 d5 4.ed5 Nf6 5.Bb5 Bd7 6.Bc4 Qe7 7.Be2 7...Nd5 (Black is already equal! This is highly unusual in correspondence play. Lou probably was delighted to see this version of a reverse-Latvian!) 8.0-0 Nc6 9.c4 Nf6 10.d4 0-0-0 11.Bf4 Ng4 12.Od2 h6 13.Nc3 Ob4 14.Bc7 (Oops! Well at least Lou did not have to sacrifice a whole rook to give his pieces the activity that they now obtain!) 14...Re8 15.Bg3 g5 (To prevent 16. Qf4.) 16.d5 Bc5 17.Kh1 (Now Lou works the Black squares expertly.) 17...Be3 18.Qc2 Nce5 19.h3 h5 (One expects these shots from Lou. His correspondence games are replete with such moves.) 20.Ne4 f6 (Played so that he can maintain his Knight on g4.) 21.Be1 Qe7 22.Nh2 f5 23.Nf2 Nh2 (Black finally lifts the threat of the Knight sac after five moves of continuous daring!) 24.Kh2 g4 25.Nd1 f4 26.Ne3 fe3 27.h4 Rhg8 28.g3 Ref8 29.Kg2 Rf1 30.Bf1 Rf8 31.Bd3 Nd3 32.Qd3 Qf6 (Even correspondence chess has its unstopable shots. The f3 square and all the white squares about the White King are terminally weak.) 33.Qc2 Qf1 34.Kh2 Qh3 35.Kg1 Rf1 0-1.

Tom Rowan swept through the eight rounds of the roundrobin City Championship which streched incredibly from early
September to late December. His total of seven wins and a
draw put him a full point ahead of Leonard Dickerson who
finished second with five wins and three draws. Mike Abron
had a fine showing with +5 =1 -2 score to his credit. Larry
Williams, Jr., had a "break through" tournament, scoring wins
against adults for the first time - not just once, but three times!

TCA/TCN is ruinous for one's rating!

This year's tournament was a round-robin format after many years of holding qualifying and final tournaments. The attempt to "level the playing field" by eliminating the smaller and inherently uneven qualifying sections proved to be quite a challenge for organizers/TD's Rick Igou and John Anthony. Unanticipated site closings and early adjournment times made the task of completing the rounds before the end of 1993 a formidable one. Despite the difficulties, only one of the 36 games was declared a forfeit.

Louis M. Groeniger Remembered


