In the final position the unhappy king is enclosed in an equilateral triangle consisting of the Black queen and her two knights. No black pawns support this triangle, although a black pawn is involved in the mate. Being a chemist, I call this a "clathrate" checkmate. This is because of the analogy to the type of compounds called clathrate compounds, in which small molecules are trapped in the crystal lattice of other compounds. The word clathrate comes from a latin word meaning lattice.
