TCA Dues \$1 a Year

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ANNOUNCING THE 7th ANNUAL MID-SOUTH OPEN

As in past years, this only regional event in Tennessee will be contested over the Thanksgiving holidays in Memphis. Specifically it will take place at the Hotel Claridge, 109 N. Main Street in Memphis, Tenn. 38101.

The event will again be contested in three divisions as follows: OPEN DIVISION which is open to all; AMATEUR DIVISION open to all except those rated above 1799; and the RESERVE DIVISION which is open to all except those rated above 1599.

Entry fees are \$8.00 in the OPEN, \$6.00 in the AMATEUR and RESERVE. Of course USCF membership is required and can be obtained still at \$4.00 discount rate.

Prizes in the Open are as follows: First \$100, Second \$50, and Third \$25, trophies go to first in other divisions, with books to second and third places.

Time limit will be 50 moves in 2½ hours.

MURFREESBORO TOPS NASHVILLE

Murfreesboro pulled quite an upset when they defeated a Nashville team by a score of 6½ - 3½. Perhaps Nashville had an excuse for not fielding the strongest team, but Murfreesboro deserves credit for such a surprising feat.

Originally the match was planned as a test match by telephone with the intention of playing the match between Memphis and Nashville later also by phone. However a phone match could not be worked out. If such a match were possible between Memphis and Nashville this would save about four hours traveling time for each team on one day.

The over-the-board match took place on Oct. 23 at the Nashville Boys Club. It was a one round affair on 10 boards. The individual results were as follows:

MINUTES OF THE BUSINESS MEETING OF THE T.C.A.

Minutes of the Sept. 3, 1966 meeting, first session. In the absence of the President and Vice President the meeting was called to order by Mike Coveyou. The reading of the minutes from the 1965 meeting were dispensed with.

The members of the Nominating Committee were announced; they are as follows: Pete Lahde, Tony Estes, Mike Coveyou, Bobby Churchill, Bob Keathley, and D. Burris. It was announced that Bob Keathley was resigning as Tournament Arrangements Director to run for President and that Mike Coveyou was resigning as Postal Chess Director to run for Vice-President.

Dues for T.C.A. were discussed and it was decided that new dues effective January 1968 would be \$2.00 for Tennessee residents, \$4.00 for clubs, \$1.00 for second members of families and \$1.00 for out of state members. This action was approved by the majority of the members present.

The time limit was discussed and voted to be changed to 50 moves in 2½ hours.

Members of various chess clubs in Tennessee gave reports and they are as follows: David Burris announced the starting of a University of Tennessee Chess Club and plans for a city club. Bob Coveyou for Oak Ridge announced their Junior tournament over the Christmas holidays and the East Tennessee Open both held annually. Bob Keathley for Murfreesboro gave a report on the Murfreesboro Chess Club. The club now has 20 active members and holds an annual club tournament. Roy Clark from Murfreesboro announced that M.T.S.U. has a Chess Club called the MTSU Chessnuts. The club has an annual club student-faculty match. Bobby Churchill from Memphis reported a new chess club in Memphis which meets at the home of Hunter Weeks. The annual Mid-South Tournament at Memphis over the Thanksgiving weekend was also announced.

It was moved and seconded that the meeting be recessed until September 4.

The second session was called to order on Sunday, September 4, 1966 at 6:40PM. The following slate of nominees was unanimously elected: (terms expire 1969)

The following was adopted unanimously: Any club in Tennessee which requests publicity for its tournaments in the T.C.N. must be an affiliate in good standing with the T.C.A. The Postal Chess Director be asked to study the feasibility of holding future Tennessee Postal Tournaments and to make a report with recommendations to the 1967 T.C.A. Business Meeting. Be it further resolved that a committee of two other members be appointed to assist the Postal Chess Director in this study. - The meeting was then adjourned.

SOME INTERESTING STATISTICS FROM THE TENNESSEE OPEN

As there were 22 players in both the OPEN and AMATEUR Divisions 66 games were played in each, or a total of 132 games. In both divisions White was able to win a few more games than Black, and draws were quite few. Here is the way both divisions compare in both of these departments:

The Openings showed a decided preference for the King's Pawn Semi-Open Game with 24 games of which 15 games were Sicilian. The King's Pawn Open Game had 14 games. Of the Queen's Pawn Openings there were 12 games and 11 were of the Indian variety. The rest is made up of 5 games with the English Opening. Of the openings only the OPEN division is considered.

NEWS IN BRIEF

The latest word is that the State Department permitted eight Americans to enter Cuba to represent the United States at the Chess Olympiad in Havana. The event has already begun on Oct. 22 and will conclude Nov. 20. Representing the United States is Bobby Fischer, the Byrne brothers Robert and Donald, Pal Benko, Larry Evans and Rossolimo. Team captain will be Fred Cramer. The Soviet Union is represented by Petrosian, Spassky, Korchnoi, Tal, Stein, and Polugaevsky.

In Memphis a match between Lyle Priddy and Bobby Churchill ended in a victory for Priddy with a score of 3-1.

The annual match between Memphis and Nashville is to take place on Nov.13 in Jackson, Tenn. Aside from the regular match on 10 boards, a five board high school match is also planned.

A simultaneous exhibition will be given in Nashville by Tom Wiswell at chess and checkers at the downtown YMCA on January 21. There will be no charge as the YMCA is sponsoring the event.

- (a) Black has chosen an inferior but little known line in the Sicilian. It resembles the Boleslavsky Variation. But here White has better in meeting it with 6 KN-N5 P-Q3 7 B-N5 P-QR3 8 BxN or 8 N-R3 which favor White(MCO 10, pg. 201)
- (b) If now 8...RxB this could lead to complicated play as White has 9. B-N3. But this should probably preceeded by 9. BxN.
- (c) White has an advantage out of the opening but must now retreat as Black is defending accurately. He now threatens B-B1.
- (d) Very pretty. If now 21. KxB?, PxBch and Black wins the Queen.
- (e) Of course not 27 NxB as B-D7 loses a piece.
- (f) I felt I had missed a winning chance with 34 R-N7 R-B1 35 N-Q3 threatening 36 NxB RxB 37 RxB but after 34 R-N7 Black simply plays R-N3.
- (g) 39. NxB, PxB should draw easily, but 39...K-N5? 40 N-R4 K-R6 41 R-KN7! looks too dangerous for Black.
- (h) The last drawing chance was 46. N-R4. (i) The decisive penetration.
- (j) Even now 48 RxB still holds drawing chances. (k) Of course not 49 NxB B-Q5ch, winning the Knight. But instead of the text R-KB7 was better.

- (c) The only winning chance.
- (d) The decisive error. Correct is 38...QxQP and if 39 QxNP Q-K7ch 40 Q-N2 QxP and with Queens on the board Black should be able to draw despite White's extra Pawn. After the text White is a pawn up but there are no queens.
