STEVE BALSAL OF ARKANSAS WINS MID-SOUTH

Steve Balsal of Hot Springs, Ark., was the winner of the seventh annual Mid-South tournament with a $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$ score. The event took place in Memphis over the Thanksgiving weekend. Second and third places were taken by Levine of New Orleans and Ken Williamson of Huntsville with $4\frac{1}{2}$ points. Fourth and fifth places were taken by Hurt of Memphis and Belke of Little Rock with four points.

The tourney was well attended with thirty-three participants. Only one player from East Tennessee - Emanuel Tsitsekis from Knoxville and none from Middle Tenn. took part.

We are indebted to a good number of the games to John Hurt. They can be found on pages 4 & 5 of this issue. We hope to get the complete results of this event for next issue.

LOMBARDY WINS PEACH STATE OPEN

With $5\frac{1}{2}$ points out of six William Lombardy of New York took top honors in this second annual Peach State Open. The event took place over the Thanksgiving holidays in Atlanta, Ga. Momic and Truesdel both scored five points. Master Momic of Muscle Shoals, Ala. apparently drew two games, one with Lombardy, the other with Sherwin. Sherwin of New York, a participant in the recently concluded U.S. Champ. only had $4\frac{1}{2}$ points. One game he lost as a result of an upset by William Scott of Atlanta.

Four players from Tennessee took part, two from Middle and two from East Tenn. Tony Estes of Nashville scored $2\frac{1}{2}$ points and Gary Matthews of Nashville had two. The scores turned in by Irwin of Knoxville and Jollay of Talbott we did not obtain. The event attracted some 49 players.

FISCHER WINS AGAIN

For the eighth time Bobby Fischer took top honors in the U.S. Championship just concluded in New York. Although not as spectacular than in 1963/4 when he won all the games it was a remarkable achievement as he scored $9\frac{1}{2}$ out of 11 points. He won 8 games and drew 3 (Evans, R. Byrne, and Addison). Among his victims were: Reshevsky, Benko, Bisguier, Zuckerman, D. Byrne, Sherwin, Saigy, and Rossolino.

U.S. TAKES SECOND IN OLYMPICS

Thanks to the phenomenal play on first board by Bobby Fischer the United States took second place in the International Team Tournament held during November in Havana, Cuba. Originally it was even doubtful if a team from the U.S. was going to be permitted by the state department to participate. Then a debacle occurred when the U.S. team was to meet the USSR. A US team with Fischer was not present at the time the meet between the two countries was scheduled. This was because the U.S. team had received permission to play this match later. This was so that Fischer could observe the Sabbath. However some of the stipulations were not so clear and the match was awarded to Russia. Finally the misunderstanding was resolved and the match took place later after all. The USSR won by $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$. Fischer apparently had a win but could not find so he drew with Spassky. Bonko and Evans also drew but Robert Byrne lost to Tal.

Fischer scored 15 out of 17 points in the event winning 14, drawing two, and losing only to Gheorghiu of Rourmania. The World Champion Petrosian of Russia topped this by a minute margin with $11\frac{1}{2}$ out of 13. Both had the best individual records among all the players from 52 nations. The standings:

Fifteen players from Tennessee was only topped by Georgia (43) and Florida (25).

The best record was achieved by our current state champion David Burris of Knoxville. With $4\frac{1}{2}$ points out of 7 he came in tenth in the Open.
